This sum represents payment for the first year of a five-year level funded contract that provides for a full update of property values to market rate in 2015 as required by RSA 75:8-a, as well as general assessing



services throughout each of the five years and field data verification of information appearing on property tax cards. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 11.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for road reconstruction. This requires a majority vote. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 12.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000.00) for road resurfacing and sealing. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 13.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to replace the windows in the Municipal Office Building with energy efficient windows, to reduce future energy costs. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 14.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-one Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$31,850.00) for payments to the following Capital Reserve Accounts:

The sum of Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$13,500.00) to come from the undesignated fund balance, this sum represents reimbursements received for police officer details in 2010. The remaining amount of Twenty Thousand Five Hundred

Dollars (\$20,500.00) to be withdrawn from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 16.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to fund an engineering study to optimize operations at the Effingham Transfer Station. The study will include a 20-year forecast, implementation schedule and funding requirements for proposed improvements. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article.

**Article 17.** To see if the Town will vote to appoint the Conservation Commission as agents to expend from the Aquatic Invasive Plants Capital Reserve Fund previously established. This requires a majority vote.

**Article 18.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be added to the Emergency Management/Disaster Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 19.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be added to the Municipal Buildings Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 20.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) to be added to the Planning and Land Use Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 21.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be added to the Parks and Recreation Trust Fund previously established. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 22.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to be added to the Library Equipment Expendable Trust Fund previously established. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 23.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to support Life Bridge, Inc. Life Bridge is a teen mentoring organization serving students in the Kingswood Regional High and Middle Schools. Life Bridge supports at-risk students aged 12 to 18 with one-to-one mentoring

services and offers students healthy group events aimed at helping curb delinquency and risky behaviors. Currently Life Bridge serves about 25 families from Effingham. This article is petitioned by Andrew Johnson and others. This requires a majority vote. The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation.

**Article 24.** To see if the Town of Effingham will vote to establish the Technology Development Expendable Trust Fund, under the authority of RSA 31:19-a, for the purpose of evaluation and pursuing the expansion of broadband access to underserved areas, and updating the Town website; and to appropriate to this fund the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) from the Town's unreserved fund balance (to which cable franchise fees received by the Town are deposited); and further, to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the fund. This article is petitioned by Eve Klotz and others. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 25.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to purchase a digital/audio camera for the purpose of recording all public meetings for residents to review who cannot make the meetings and also for historical preservation. This article is petitioned by Tammy Sinapius and others. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation.



MINUTES OF THE EFFINGHAM TOWN MEETING 2010

Session I: Tuesday, March 9, 2010

J. Michael Cauble, Moderator Pro-Tem called the meeting to order at 11:00 AM; a motion was made by Marilynn Maughan, seconded by Sheila Jones to forego the reading of the first 4 articles. Motion passed by unanimous voice vote. Mr. Cauble declared the polls open.

Susan Slack, Moderator closed the polls at 7:00 PM; Ballot Clerks Marilynn Maughan, Deanna Amaral, Tracy Cragin, Gwenda English, J. Michael Cauble and Timothy Eldridge counted the town ballots for election of officers and the 3 questions. The Governor Wentworth Regional School District ballots were delivered to Wolfeboro for counting by Chief of Police Joseph Collins. Meeting was adjourned at 8:15 PM to re-convene at the Effingham Elementary School on Saturday, March 13, 2009 at 9:00 AM.

Article 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Zoning Ordinance Amendment Number 2010-1 as proposed by the Planning Board to add a new Article 20, as per RSA 674:58-61, allowing single family workforce housing in all districts except the Historic and Province Lake Districts and allowing multi-family workforce housing within 500' of Rt. 25 and Rt. 153 but not in the Village or Historic Districts? Yes 131, No 80.

Article 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Zoning Ordinance Amendment Number 2010-2 as proposed by the Planning Board to add a new Article 21, as per RSA 674:62-66, allowing small wind energy systems in all districts except the Historic and Province Lake Districts? Yes 168, No 42.

Article 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Zoning Ordinance Amendment Number 2010-3 as proposed by the Planning Board to make various formatting corrections and minor housekeeping changes within the Zoning Ordinances? Yes 152, No 55.

Session II: Susan Slack, Moderator gaveled the meeting to order 9:15 AM on Saturday, March 13, 2010 with approximately 150 Effingham residents and non-residents in attendance. Town Clerk Marilyn Maughan, read the election results from March 9, 2010. Moderator Slack then proceeded to explain how the meeting would be conducted and read Article 5 to the voters present.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 154:1, I(b), to organize the Town of Effingham Fire Department as follows: a fire chief appointed by the Board of Selectmen upon the recommendation of a Selectmen appointed review board. Officers and firefighters will be appointed to the Town's fire department upon the recommendation of the fire chief, by the Board of Selectmen. This requires a majority vote.

The article was moved by John Meisner, seconded by David Manley. Discussion began with Selectman Meisner reading a statement prepared by the Board clarifying the issues surrounding this article. Attorney Matthew Serge gave a statement outlining the insurance issues regarding the Fire Department following their standard operating procedures and the duties of the Fire Chief with the Board of Selectmen being the employer not the overseers of the Fire Department, with the volunteers being employees. Acting Fire Chief John Burdette spoke against the article. A motion was made by Henry Spencer, seconded by John Meisner to amend the article to include "...a fire chief appointed by the Board of Selectmen to a three year term...". The amendment to Article 5 passed by majority hand vote. Following the passing of the amendment to Article 5, Michael Caubie made a motion to move the article, seconded by Eve Klotz. Motion passed by majority hand vote. The final wording of Article 5 is: "To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to RSA 154:1, I(b), to organize the Town of Effingham Fire Department as follows: a fire chief appointed by the Board of Selectmen to a three year term upon the recommendation of a Selectmen appointed review board. Officers and firefighters will be appointed to the Town's fire department upon the recommendation of the fire chief, by the Board of Selectmen.

Moderator Slack then announced that she had been given a petition by five voters requesting a secret ballot vote and we then proceeded to vote by secret ballot. The petition is attached herein by reference. Once everyone was given an opportunity to cast their ballot vote, Marilynn Maughan, Town Clerk and Deanna Amaral, Deputy Town Clerk, counted the ballots. Article 5 passed by ballot vote: 94 yes ballots, 44 no ballots.

Gwen English made a motion to restrict reconsideration of Article 5, seconded by Michael Cauble. The motion passed by majority hand vote. Moderator Susan Slack announced a moment of silence in honor of those Effingham residents that passed away during 2009.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty One Thousand Five Hundred and Eleven Dollars (\$31,511.00) to contract the services of Avitar Associates of New England, Inc. for the year 2010. This sum represents payment for the fifth year of a five-year level funded contract that provides for a full update of property values to market rate in 2010 as required by RSA 75:8-a, as well as general assessing services throughout each of the five years and field data verification of information appearing on property tax cards.

The article was moved by Timothy Eldridge, seconded by John Meisner. There was no discussion. The article passed by majority hand vote.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) for road reconstruction.

The article was moved by William Piekut, seconded by John Meisner. Discussion: Sheila Jones asked what roads the funds would be used on. Selectman Piekut listed Bailey Road, Colcord Hill Road, Moody Road and Granite Road. William Brooks asked for an explanation as to what the difference was between Article 7 and Article 8. Selectman Piekut explained that Article 7 involved repairs to the roads and Article 8 involved the paving of the roads. Following the brief discussion, Article 7 passed by majority hand vote.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000.00) for road resurfacing and sealing.

The article was moved by John Meisner, seconded by Timothy Eldridge. Following a short discussion, the article was passed by majority hand vote.

A motion was made by Michael Pilkovsky, seconded by Paul Bartoswicz, to discuss Article 11 prior to Article 9. The motion passed by majority hand vote.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) from the undesignated fund balance to be added to the Fire Truck and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The \$1,000.00 was received from the Town of Parsonsfield in 2009 for Fire Department Mutual Aid.

The article was moved by William Piekut, seconded by Timothy Eldridge. No discussion. Article 10 passed by majority hand vote.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Ossipee Co-Op Preschool, a non-profit organization which currently serves three Effingham families. This article is petitioned by Kimberly Seamans and others.

The article was moved by Timothy Eldridge, seconded by William Piekut. Discussion: Paul Bartoswicz, Chairman of the Budget Committee explained that the reason the Budget Committee did not recommend the article was due to his discussion with the Department of Revenue. Mr. Bartoswicz was told by DRA that the article would not pass their review due to the limited language, i.e., "....serves three Effingham families". Gwenda English then made a motion, seconded by Eve Klotz, to amend the article's language as follows: "...which currently serves Effingham families". The amendment passed by majority hand vote. We then proceeded to vote on the amended article which now read: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the Ossipee Co-Op Preschool, a non-profit organization which currently services Effingham Families. The amended article then passed by majority hand vote.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to establish an Agricultural Commission as permitted by RSA 674:44-e. The word "agriculture" shall include the entirety of RSA 21:34-a, which is the definition of farm, agriculture, and farming. The Commission members will be appointed in conformance with RSA 673:4-b, specifically, not less than 3 and no more than 7 with 5 alternates. All shall be residents of Effingham, and may also serve on other boards and commissions. This article is petitioned by Paul Bartoswicz and others.

The article was moved by Paul Bartoswicz, seconded by Eve Klotz. A motion was then made by Paul Bartoswicz, seconded by Eve Klotz to amend this article to read: "The Commission members will be appointed by the Board of Selectmen in conformance with RSA 673:4-b, specifically, not less than 5 members and 5 alternates." The amendment to the article passed by majority hand vote. We then proceeded to vote on the amended article which now read: To see if the Town will vote to establish an Agricultural Commission as permitted by RSA 674:44-e. The word "agriculture" shall include the entirety of RSA 21:34-a, which is the definition of farm, agriculture, and farming. The Commission members will be appointed by the Board of Selectmen in conformance with RSA 673:4-b, specifically, not less than 5 members and 5 alternates. All shall be residents of Effingham, and may also serve on other boards and commissions. The amended article then passed by majority hand vote.

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) to fund an Agricultural Commission, in the event that warrant Article 19, establishing an Agricultural Commission for the Town of Effingham passes. This article is petitioned by Paul Bartoswicz and others.

The article was moved by Paul Bartoswicz, seconded by John Meisner. No discussion. The article passed by majority hand vote.

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) in support of Carroll County Transit for the following transportation services; Public Transit Fixed and Commuter Routes, Demand Response Senior Transportation and Long Distance Non-Emergency Medical Transportation. This article is petitioned by Louise Champion and others.

The article was moved by Henry Spencer, seconded by Cheryle Feirick. Following a short discussion, The article failed by majority hand vote.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representative(s), our State Senator, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate President:

Resolved: The citizens of New Hampshire should be allowed to vote on an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution that defines "marriage". This article is petitioned by Kathleen Mudgett and others.

The article was moved by Neil Eric Potter, seconded by Jory Augenti. Following a lengthy discussion whereby several amendments were proposed, a motion was made by Blair Folts,



seconded by Michael Pilkovsky, to pass over this article. The motion passed on a majority hand vote.

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Two Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-Eight Dollars (\$52,668.00) for the installation of an emergency generator and upgrading of the electrical system at the Municipal Office Building, which serves as the Emergency Operations Center for the Town. The sum of \$26,334.00 to come from the State of New Hampshire for this purpose. The remaining amount of \$26,334.00 is to be raised from taxation. If this warrant article fails, the Town will return \$26,334.00 to the granting authority.

The article was moved by John Meisner, seconded by Timothy Eldridge. Following a brief discussion, the article passed on a majority hand vote.

A motion was made by Gwenda English, seconded by John Meisner to restrict reconsideration of Articles 15, 16, 18 through 23. The motion passed by majority hand vote.

Article 24: to see if the Town will vote to exempt the following uses from the Site Plan Review Regulations, as authorized by RSA 674:43, IV, and to direct the Planning Board to amend its Site Plan Review Regulations to reflect these exemptions:

- 1) Cottage Industries, as defined in Section 302 of the Zoning Ordinance that are an accessory use and subordinate to a residential use;
- 2) Home Occupations, as defined in Section 302 of the Zoning Ordinance;
- 3) Farm, as defined in Section 302 of the Zoning Ordinance.

All Other Town, State and Federal laws and rules shall apply to the above uses.

The article was moved by Timothy Eldridge, seconded by Paul Bartoswicz. Following a brief discussion, a motion was made by William Piekut seconded by Cheryle Feirick to pass over this article. The motion to pass over the article passed by majority hand vote.

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to establish a special site review committee as authorized by RSA 674:43,III which will have final authority to approve or disapprove minor site plans for non-exempt new or expanding existing commercial uses that are no greater than 10,000 square feet in area.

The article was moved by William Piekut, seconded by Timothy Eldridge. A motion was made by Eve Klotz, seconded by Cheryle Feirick to pass over this article. The motion to pass over the article passed by majority hand vote.

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for personal allotments/stipends for Effingham Fire Department members.

The article was moved by Cheryle Feirick, seconded by John Meisner. Following a lengthy discussion whereby several amendments were proposed, a motion was made by Eve Klotz, seconded by Gwenda English to amend the article as "...for Effingham Fire Department

members based upon a collaborative recommendation between the Fire Chief representing the Effingham Fire Department and the Board of Selectmen. The amendment to the article passed on a majority hand vote. We then proceeded to vote on the amended article which read: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for personal allotments/stipends for Effingham Fire Department members based upon a collaborative recommendation between the Fire Chief representing the Effingham Fire Department and the Board of Selectmen." The amended article passed on majority hand vote.

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of its agents and auditors.

The article was moved by Timothy Eldridge, seconded by David Manley. No discussion. The article passed on a majority hand vote.

Article 28: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Blair Folts announced the Green Mountain Conservation Group would be holding seminars regarding the aquifer concerns. Jory Augenti made a motion to instruct the Board of Selectmen to make the new Fire Chief a resident of Effingham. Arthur Surette seconded the motion. The motion failed by a majority hand vote. Gwenda English made a motion to restrict reconsideration of Articles 17 and 27. David Manley seconded the motion. The motion to restrict reconsideration of Articles 17 and 27 passed by majority hand vote. Neil Eric Potter announced that the Effingham History Project would resume at the Effingham Public Library on Saturday, April 24 at 1:00 PM. Mellisa Ferland announced that there were still raffle tickets available for the Car/Kaching Raffle benefiting Shawn Palumbo. A motion was made by Sheila Jones, seconded by Henry Spencer to adjourn the 2010 Effingham Town Meeting. The motion passed on a unanimous voice vote. Meeting was adjourned by Moderator Susan Slack at 2:25 PM.

## Selectmen's Report

The year 2010 presented the Board of Selectmen and the Town's residents with many changes. With voter approval for the Board to restructure the Effingham Fire Department, we moved forward with the task of finding the most qualified candidate to fill the position of Fire Chief of a newly organized Department. As a Board, we removed ourselves from the selection process, so as to avoid any perception of preference. The Local Government Center, an organization created for the purpose of assisting New Hampshire municipalities, took control of the entire recruitment process, from advertising to interviewing and verifying qualifications. After qualified candidates had been identified by LGC, a panel of Effingham residents met and interviewed them. Throughout this process, an objective scoring system was used. Your edict to restructure the Department, by statute, becomes effective with the March 2011 Town Meeting. We are very pleased to report that as of March 12<sup>th</sup>, Mr. Randy Burbank will become Fire Chief of the Effingham Volunteer Fire Department. Randy has been a member of the EFD for many years, serving in a number of positions within the Department. Randy also is the Town's Emergency Management Director and plans to continue in that capacity. Over the past several years, he has secured countless State and Federal grants providing funding for hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of equipment, improvements and reimbursements for our Town. He is a retired professional firefighter, trained in emergency medical services. He is familiar with the workings of the Town, having routinely attended weekly Selectmen's meetings for years. He knows and has worked with all Town officials and personnel that he will be interacting with in the performance of his duties. Randy is an established member of the area's firefighting and EMS community, setting the groundwork for a smooth transition to working as a Chief within the mutual aid system, made up of area departments and community agencies. We thank Randy for his willingness to serve the Town in this capacity. We also want to express our gratitude to all those who have worked to establish and maintain the Effingham Volunteer Fire Department; a department known for dedication to service for decades. We are confident that Randy will lead the Effingham Fire Department into the future, while upholding that proud tradition of dedication to service.

We are pleased to report to the people of Effingham that our Police Chief, Joe Collins was awarded a "Distinguished Service" commendation by the New Hampshire Association of Chiefs of Police in 2010. Chief Collins was at an event when an individual suffered a cardiac arrest. Joe administered CPR for nearly ten minutes until emergency medical personnel arrived. Medical professionals credit Chief Collins for the survival of the patient. He had recently recertified in CPR, after instituting an Effingham Police Department directive that all officers be required to be certified in CPR. The grateful patient whose life was saved attended the presentation of the citation. Chief Collins was completely unaware that the Chiefs Association was honoring him with this award and was characteristically humbled. The presentation of the award was reported in "Town and City", a publication of the New Hampshire Local Government Center.


The Town's contracted assessing firm completed a Town-wide revaluation of property in 2010. A complete revaluation is required every five years, under State of New Hampshire Law. The Department of Revenue monitors assessors as the revaluation is being conducted. The process includes a complete review of all property tax credits and tax exemptions, current use documentation, the Town's tax maps and overall internal operating procedures and policies. Due to our Board's full commitment to keeping the assessment of property in the hands of certified, unbiased contractors, the dedicated efforts of seasoned office personnel and our voter's financial investment in a fair and lawful process, the revaluation went smoothly enough to be completed at a savings of over \$20,000 less than projected expenses. Consequently, the contract for the next five year cycle has been reduced by several thousand dollars per year. In the interim years between revaluations, the Department of Revenue continues to monitor the assessment function, as our contracted firm verifies the accuracy of data

reflected on Town property records. Each parcel of property within the Town is expected to be visited in the next four year period, prior to the next revaluation in 2015.


As we move into this year, our Board will be changing. It was with our deepest regret that we accepted the resignation of Selectman William (Bill) Piekut in the fall of 2010. Bill was first elected to the Board of Selectmen in 2001. Prior to that he served as the Planning Board Chairman, and had a history of community service in many capacities. His service as a Selectman was unmatched in his commitment to the Town. He attended informational meetings and workshops often during his entire term in office, returning with valuable information, contacts and resources for the Town. He acquired State certification in Solid Waste Management, completed a road maintenance program, and served as the Board representative on the Town's Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment. His accomplishments were countless during his time in office and his contribution to the Board was immeasurable. The Town of Effingham was well served under his leadership. Bill is continuing to serve our community as Deputy Emergency Management Director and a member of the Effingham Fire Department. For his past and continued willingness to serve, we thank him on behalf of the townspeople of Effingham. Then Town Moderator, Susan Slack agreed to accept our appointment to the Board to fill the vacancy created by Bill's resignation. Susan is an Attorney, formerly employed by the Local Government Center. Susan provided general legal information to member municipal officials in her position with LGC and therefore provides a level of knowledge in municipal government that one would rarely find on a Board of Selectmen. Selectman Timothy Eldridge has decided to vacate his seat on the Board after serving since 2003. Tim has been serving as the informal personnel director for the Board and has been instrumental in establishing and implementing policies and procedures related to personnel administration. He has contributed greatly to the mutual efforts of the long standing Board which has maintained financial stability in the Town over the past several years. Whoever is elected to his seat on the Board, will take his or her position on the Board of Selectman knowing that the Town is fiscally sound and compliant with all municipal statutory requirements, and Tim is to be commended for his part in this achievement.

Moving forward, the Board will take on the challenges that have been presented by our depressed economic times. We are proud of our record of maintaining a near level Town tax rate, and occasionally being able to reduce the Town rate without sacrificing Town services. We will continue to explore opportunities and create efficiencies that will allow us to maintain the lowest possible Town tax rate. While we have no control, as a Board, of taxes the Town is obligated to collect on behalf of the School District and Carroll County, we urge you, as citizens to participate in the budgeting process of these democracies that operate on your behalf with funding you provide. We make our commitment to you to acknowledge the financial burden our taxpayers are under in these stressful times, and pledge to handle our fiscal responsibilities accordingly.





## **Report of Effingham Police Department for 2010**

The Year 2010 started and finished as a busy time for the Effingham Police Department.

Several burglaries were reported involving residences located on Pine River Road. Investigation into the complaints resulted in the arrests and successful prosecution of two local men for Burglary and Criminal Trespassing.

The year ended with assistance to the Ossipee Police Department in the capture of a wanted subject suspected of robbing the Rite aid in Ossipee.

The majority of non criminal calls for service were for assisting other agencies or assisting citizen calls.

Speed Enforcement patrols and County Wide DWI patrols will continue this year as part of the New Hampshire Highway Safety Department's Grant Program. Motorists are advised to please maintain safe and reasonable speeds and operate with care on all the roads in the Town of Effingham.

## EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

I will start by thanking the Taxpayers of Effingham for passing Article 23 at last years Town Meeting. This Article provided the matching funds required for a grant we received for the upgrade of the electrical system and the installation of an emergency generator at the Town's Municipal Building.

I am happy to say that the electrical work has been completed and the generator has been installed and is up and running.

With the installation of this generator, the Town Municipal Building can now be used as the Town's Emergency Operations Center. Here there are multiple phone lines, cell service and a quiet enviroment in which an Emergency Operations Center needs to operate efficiently.

2010 started off with the second round of swine flu shots for children under the age of nine. Thankfully that epidemic quickly subsided.

The rest of 2010 was fairly quiet. Area Emergency Management Directors are still meeting every other month to develop a county wide mass antibiotic dispensing plan, should another outbreak occur.

The Town has a new Deputy Emergency Management Director. His name is Bill Piekut. With Bill's knowledge and experience in which the Town operates, Bill will be a valuable asset to the community.

In closing, I would like to thank Claudia and Gwen of the Selectmens Office for all of their help throughout the year.

## Library Director's 2010 Annual Report

2010 was another year of steady growth for the Effingham Public Library. Patron visits increased 14% over 2009; circulation of library materials increased 17%; and computer usage increased 4%. For the first time ever, the library logged over 800 patron visits in a single month during July- averaging one patron every nine minutes the library was open.

Attendance at library programs for adults decreased 10% over last year, while attendance at children's and family programs increased by 20%. Programs for adults included the weekly Knit and Crochet group, the monthly Writer's Night, Literacy Workshops for parents, Herbal Workshops presented by Kathy Lambert, and a Poems and Publishing workshop presented by Robert Demaree. Children's and family programs included the weekly story time for preschool children, monthly Crafty Kids Club activities, family movie matinees, Teen Advisory Board, and our annual celebrations, including the Dr. Seuss Birthday Bash, Easter-Egg Hunt, Halloween party and costume parade, and Christmas party, which featured a visit from Santa Claus.

This year's Summer Reading Program had a record 40 children participating. Nineteen of those were teens who showed up for our first-ever Teen Summer Reading Program. Participants read a record 823 books, and logged 15,722 minutes (or 262 hours) of reading over the 6-week program! Special events included movies for families and teen movie nights, a teen read-a-thon, a visit from the Boston Museum of Science, and a performance by the Mickey Spain Musical Jamboree. Planning for the teen program relied on assistance from a newly-formed Teen Advisory Board made up of students in grades 6 - 12. Thanks to the success of that program, the Teen Advisory Board now meets monthly for programs and activities planned by the teens themselves.

Library staff continue working with the school, and visit monthly to read to students in kindergarten through third grade. Staff also participate in special events when asked, and maintain a book return at the school for the convenience of school staff, students and their families. In addition, we provide resources and library services for high school classes from the Lakeview Neurorehabilitation Unit.

The Friends of the Effingham Library has generously provided passes to the Remick Country Doctor Museum and Farm, the Squam Lakes Natural Science Center, and the Wright Museum for use by library patrons.

A group of anonymous donors arranged to have a telescope presented to the library by the New Hampshire Astronomical Society. The Orion Starblast telescope comes with a map of the moon and constellation charts, and is available for library patrons to borrow.

Library Assistant John Mingori left in late August to return to teaching. While he is definitely missed, it has been a pleasure to welcome Terry Wheeler back as the Library Assistant.

A big thank you to our wonderful, dedicated volunteers: Michael Davidson, Ginny Dumas, Donna Gruel, Kathy Lambert, Carol Pfister, Ralph Staffier, Thomas Staffier, and Michelle Taylor. They provided over 711 hours of service- nearly 30 WEEKS of time!

Thank you also to the residents of Effingham, for supporting your library and for making it such a well-used resource and important part of your community.

2. All trash and recyclables shall be placed in designated containers.
3. The following refuse will be accepted at the transfer station:
- Paper, plastics
  - Glass does not have to be separated by color
  - Metal, including aluminum cans
  - Tires with a rim size of 16.5 or less
  - Large metal (refrigerators, washers, stoves, bicycles, bed springs, metal drums, etc.)
  - Brush including stumps to 5" and untreated wood scraps
  - Household garbage
4. The following refuse will **not** be accepted:
- Explosives such as dynamite and ammunition
  - Gas or gas products (except used uncontaminated motor oil in acceptable container).
  - Other hazardous items such as strong acids and bases, highly volatile products and asbestos.
  - Human or animal waste
  - Motor vehicles (cars, trucks, motorcycles, buses, tractors, etc.)
  - Tires with a rim size larger than 16.5
5. Use of firearms in the transfer station is absolutely forbidden.
6. The transfer station attendant and Town Police Department is empowered to enforce these rules and regulations. Offenders shall be subject to fines as follows:
- 1<sup>st</sup> offense - warning
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> offense - \$10 fine
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> offense - \$20 fine
  - 4<sup>th</sup> offense - loss of dumping privileges
7. Admission to transfer station is by permit only. Permits may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office Monday, Tuesday & Thursday 9:00am to 2:00pm Friday 9:00am to Noon. There is a nominal charge for a permit. There are no other fees for permitted patrons to use the transfer station.
8. The transfer station will be closed in observance of the following holidays: Christmas, New Year's Day and Independence Day.
9. Under authority granted by RSA 31-39, the Selectmen of Effingham have adopted the following ordinance: "That no private dump shall be used or operated in the Town of Effingham. All such materials shall be transported to the Effingham Town Transfer Station under the adopted rules and regulations effective August 1, 1978.

## **Effingham Planning Board**

Land use applications made to The Planning Board were very few in number this year. One subdivision was applied for and approved. One special use permit for a driveway crossing a wetland was granted. One application for a voluntary merger was granted, two were denied. Two non residential site plans were reviewed and approved.

The Board spent considerable time this year addressing wetlands protection, aquifer protection, agricultural activities, and site plan review.

A proposal by the Effingham Conservation Commission (ECC) to amend the Wetlands article of the Zoning Ordinance was considered by the Board. The ECC had spent many months putting this proposal together. The Board spent additional months working with the ECC, and after much discussion, compromise, and rewriting, has recommended the adoption of this amendment.

A regional group concerned with protecting our underground drinking water aquifers asked the planning boards of several towns to consider groundwater protection ordinances for their communities. Several townspeople volunteered to assemble a zoning article to address this important concern. After several months of work by this subcommittee and the Board, the proposed article was completed and recommended for adoption.

Our newly formed Agricultural Commission came to the Board with proposed zoning amendments of concern to the farming community. After discussion and clarification, these changes were recommended by the Board.

All of this proposed legislation is to be put before the voters at the 2011 Town Meeting.

The Board has spent long hours this year in research and discussion aimed at amending our site plan review regulations. New ways to allow smaller businesses easier approvals will be implemented. The final revisions will be acted on in the very near future.

The Master Plan Committee is nearing the end of a long process to rewrite our Master Plan. The first sections of this plan are to be available this year. The remainder of the sections will be completed soon thereafter.

Thank you to all those concerned citizens who have given so many long hours of their time this past year working on committees, commissions, and boards to help plan for the future of our town.

The Budget Committee thanks you for the trust you have put in each of us to watch over the budget of the town of Effingham. We take this responsibility very seriously, and have worked hard to strive to strike a balance between the wants and the needs of this town. These have been and continue to be very trying economic times in this country, and we have found ourselves in these last several years with up to one out of every ten American workers out of work, and scrounging for non-existent jobs. Many of the rest have found themselves with hours and benefits cut back, and being put in a bind trying to make ends meet. While we can not control every dime the town has to spend, as we also have to send money to the school district and the county for their annual budgets. The budget committee keeps this in mind as we meet and discuss the spending plan for the next year. We are proud of the fact that while the school district, and county portions of the tax rate have continued to rise, the town portion has stayed the same or even decreased, even while towns around us have seen substantial increases in their rates, while we have been able to take care of the essential needs of the town, and ensuring adequate funds are set aside for future major purchases without causing a spike in the tax rate. There has been some question over the need for the deposits in the capital reserve funds, especially in economic times such as these, but the wisdom in setting them up and faithfully making the deposits in them every year, is that we do not know what the future will bring, and the possibility exists that the year we absolutely have to purchase a new vehicle, or make a major repair on a building we may be in the same or worse shape than we are now, so by utilizing the capital reserve funds we are able to steady the tax rate over a period of years, and not need to borrow money and pay interest on that loan in order to make the purchase or pay for the repair. So it is my hope that this town continues in the footsteps set out in town meetings before us in utilizing these funds as savings plans for the upcoming needs of the town.

Again we thank you for the support and confidence you have shown in us over the year.

## Effingham Conservation Commission

To The Residents of Effingham,

It doesn't seem like it has been over a year since a group of residents of the town got together and formed a steering committee to investigate the feasibility of forming an Agricultural Commission in town. Through the process of forming this commission we have heard from many of the residents of this wonderful town in talking about their needs and concerns. In March of last year the town overwhelmingly approved the formation of the Agricultural Commission. The Selectmen advertised the position and made a decision of the residents to make up this commission. Once formed and sworn in the Commission got right to work evaluating the needs of Agriculture in this town, and the consensus was to help create a resource center for any resident to be able to use in the pursuit of agricultural interests in the town, whether it be a personal garden to a larger farming interest. The future of local agriculture has furthermore been demonstrated as being a necessity when you consider the myriad of scares and concerns that have developed over the recent years with tainted food supplies with such concerns as salmonella tainted eggs, and leaf crops loaded with e. coli. The first priority was to review all the town ordinances and determine what was needed to make the town more agriculturally friendly. Once the ordinances were reviewed prioritizing them for what was needed to be addressed first as needing the most attention. A working definition of a farm was drawn up and submitted to the Planning Board, as well as a set of proposed guidelines to the permitted use section. The tireless work of the members such as Carol Pfister, Deb Goodwin-Potter, Tom Thompson, and Ann Marie Sargent has made the work go easy. In addition an effort was started to gain an inventory of agricultural available land for the town was undertaken and at the time of this writing is still underway. Also under discussion and planning is the possibility of bringing a farmers market to Effingham, with the possible location of the Municipal offices being discussed. We are not a town blessed with miles of lakefront property, or main thoroughfares with which to attract industrial and more commercial type of businesses. Cottage industries and agricultural type businesses are the best way for us to attract jobs to the town. Effingham also has a rich agricultural history, and there are thus in town who can remember when the expanses of woodland we see now were once open fields of working farms. Together we can make this become a memory our children enjoy also. I am currently reading a book called "The Town That Food Saved" about the economic downturn of Hardwick Vermont and how agriculture brought this town back to a viable community again. That is a vision held by many in town and the work of the agricultural commission is to help protect that ability.

Again we thank you for the ability to form this commission and work together to help foster and promote agriculture in this town. We look for great things to come

## EFFINGHAM HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

During 2010, the Commission held scheduled meetings which took place the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 P.M. at the Town Hall.

We are in place to encourage public participation in the preservation of sites, buildings and objects within the Center Effingham Historic District, the Lords Hill Historic District and on Hobbs Road, a designated Scenic Eoad. This stewardship has been continuously in conformity with Regulations. Our preservation responsibility is to save important pieces of the past to serve the future and this program is fulfilled by our focus on standards of integrity in every initiative.

We are members of the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance and the National Trust for Historic Preservation in Washington, D.C. Each has extraordinary agenda addressing stewardship of historic and cultural resources publicized that reflect and reinforce Commission heritage endeavors.

The Lords Hill Historic District is listed on the National Trust and listing for the Center Effingham Historic District is in process. Plans for signage to identify the Districts are proceeding. During the year, the N.H. Division of Historical Resources and the N.H. Department of Transportation provided especial assistance in our efforts to locate the long-missing Normal School State Marker and to the site restoral of this cultural landmark.

The President of the National Trust for 17 years, Richard Moe, retired this year. The following comment was included in his final editorial in the Trust magazine, "Preservation."

"Growing numbers of people are traveling to American places that have maintained their character, that are authentic, that tell stories."

The new President of the National Trust, Stephanie Meeks, when introduced at the organization's national conference, made the following comment.

"It matters how we build our communities and how we preserve them. We are not hanging on to yesterday, we are building tomorrow."

# Effingham Conservation Commission

## Annual report 2010

The year found Effingham Conservation Commission busy with several projects and initiatives.

The Larry Leavitt Preserve, on Rt. 153 in Effingham just north of Snow Road, saw several site improvements. Effingham Conservation Commission members cleared old down trees and brush from the site and built an information kiosk with the help of a grant from the Norcross Foundation. This kiosk, with graphic work from the UNH Cooperative Extension, provides information on bird and animal species specific to Effingham and is a great place to come, sit, reflect, and watch birds in their natural habitat. The project, although slow to complete, will resume in spring 2011 with the addition of walking trails and a bird watching platform. Volunteers are always welcome.

A roadside clean up was conducted in April and again in October in conjunction with KELF (Keep Effingham Litter Free). About 50 volunteers retrieved 130 bags of roadside litter and enjoyed a great picnic afterwards. Volunteers are always welcome to join and let's "Keep Effingham Litter Free" by having a great turnout again in 2011; please spread the word about our Earth Day clean up on April 23.

The Conservation Commission planted two Liberty Elm trees, which are resistant to Dutch elm disease, on Elm Street in Effingham this past summer. Elms are a long-lived species; they can live to be 200-275 years old and grow to 100 feet in height. The Commission hopes to plant additional trees each year throughout our town.

This year's annual Earth Day K-6 Poster Contest topic at Effingham Elementary was "How Can We Help Save the Earth's Water? ".

Milfoil was found just above the dam in Ossipee Lake, near Iron Works Road. Milfoil is a highly aggressive aquatic plant that can form dense mats which congest waterways and crowd out native aquatic plants. Thick growth can impair recreational uses of waterways including boating, swimming, and fishing. Dense growth of milfoil can alter and degrade the habitat of native fish and other wildlife. A plan was put in place to have the milfoil harvested by a team of divers in November and December. Further monitoring of this location, as well as others in Effingham, will take place this spring.

After serving as Chairman of the Effingham Conservation Commission for six years, Kamal Nath stepped down last July. During his tenure, Kamal wrote and received two Moose Plate Grants. The first grant, was the Wetland Inventory (2005-2007), followed by the 2007-2009 Wildlife Action Plan. Kamal also oversaw the writing of the Natural Resource Inventory and the revised Wetland Ordinance. He also created KELF and masterminded plans and grants for the Larry Leavitt Preserve. We are very grateful to Kamal for all his contributions.

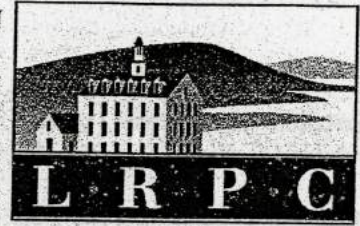

### FOR TOWN ANNUAL REPORTS LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION 2009 – 2010 (FY10)

The Lakes Region continues to grow and evolve. As our economy and world change, so does the work we are engaged in. The Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) is an organization established according to state law to provide area communities and the region with the capacity to respond to and shape the pressures of change in a purposeful way. With a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, Grafton and Merrimack Counties, the LRPC provides a wide range of planning services to member municipalities. The Commission offers direct and support services including technical assistance, geographic information systems, transportation planning, land use, environmental planning, hazard planning and economic development. Local, state, and federal resources primarily fund the LRPC. We also maintain a regular dialogue with state agencies as a resource for the entire Lakes Region. Our overall goal is to provide support, knowledge, and leadership to the governments, businesses, and citizens of the Lakes Region.

Some of the services provided on behalf of the town of Effingham and the region in the past fiscal year are noted below:

#### LOCAL

- Delivered a set of maps to support the work of the town's newly formed Agricultural Commission.
- Responded to a grant request from the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) regarding funding for updates to the National Wetlands Inventory (NWI) data in the region.
- Prepared maps of agricultural soils and aerial photography to support the efforts of the newly formed Effingham Agricultural Commission.
- Assisted the town in researching the language of 10 year old warrant articles that defined their historical and village district overlays.
- Developed a map of Carroll County for a grant application.
- Met with municipal officials and the UNH Outreach Coordinator to discuss a Master Plan proposal.
- Prepared numerous outreach materials in conjunction with Green Mountain Conservation Group (GMCG) and held Planning Board presentations in Sandwich, Freedom, Ossipee, Tamworth, and Effingham for the groundwater protection ordinance project.
- Investigated whether there are regulations for snowmobile use on prime or designated wetlands for the Conservation Commission.
- Researched windmill ordinances for town officials, including examples and commentary from three local officials. Reviewed proposed Work Force Housing and Wind Power ordinances for the town prior to planning board vote.
- Provided copies of the NH Planning and Land Use Regulation books to the town at considerable savings.

#### LAND USE

- Responded daily to requests for land use, transportation, environmental, and other information and guidance.

- Organized and hosted three public Municipal Law Lectures, in cooperation with the NH Local Government Center: 1) Constitutional Issues in Land Use Regulations; 2) The Five Variance Criteria in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century; and 3) What Do You Do When They Stop Building? Vested Rights, Modified Approvals, Violations and Revocation.
- Prepared the 2010 Development Activity in the Lakes Region report and distributed it to survey participants.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Continue to coordinate with area economic development groups including Belknap County Economic Council (BCEDC), Grafton County Economic Development Council (GCEDC), Franklin Business and Industrial Development Corporation (FBDIC), and the Wentworth Economic Development Council (WEDCO) in pursuit of workforce development and wealth creation opportunities for the region.
- Applied for and secured \$400,000 in Brownfields funding from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to help local communities identify vacant and underused sites for redevelopment and productive reuse.
- Completed the Lakes Region Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS), A Plan for Sustainable Progress, and submitted it to the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) for acceptance. The plan was officially accepted in May 2010. It contains up to 18 projects that may qualify for EDA funding.
- Coordinated an Economics Day for Leadership Lakes Region and co-presented the Lakes Region Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) to attendees.
- Completed a Phase I Lakes Region Broadband Study to determine the extent and capacity of existing broadband service.
- Planned and facilitated four Lakes Region CEDS committee meetings throughout the year, and initiated another application to EDA to help the region explore the possibility of creating an economic development district.

## TRANSPORTATION

- Conducted over 160 traffic and turning movement counts around the region.
- Convened many meetings of the LRPC Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) to enhance local involvement in regional transportation planning and project development. Conducted research on behalf of the TAC on special projects such as road salt storage rules and best management practices from several states.
- Continue to provide assistance to an exploratory committee interested in developing a Scenic Byway around Lake Winnepesaukee.
- Initiated the development of a Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan for the Region.

- Recommended a priority list of Transportation Enhancement projects to the NH Department of Transportation (NHDOT) for future funding.

## PUBLIC FACILITIES

- Secured support from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to assist the Lakes Region Facility Commission with determining the best long-term use of the former Lakes Region prison site, a location that has considerable redevelopment potential.
- Modified and improved Community Facility maps for the regional towns and posted them to LRPC's website.
- Facilitated the Energy Alliance meeting held in Campton at the White Mountain National Forest (WMNF) headquarters complex. WMNF staff, New Hampshire Co-op and Jordan Institute representatives provided an overview and discussion on the energy efficiencies and systems at the complex and conducted a tour of the facility.
- Planned and facilitated three Lakes Region Energy Alliance meetings. The Alliance is a consortium of local energy committees brought together to share ideas and activity.
- Represented the region at the Local Energy Solutions Conference, hosted by Clean Air – Cool Planet and the Local Energy Committee Working Group, in Concord. The Energy Technical Assistance Program (ETAP) was officially launched at the conference. In attendance were other RPC representatives, members of local energy committees from the Lakes Region, and other regions of NH. LRPC is the main point of contact on the ETAP program.

## HOUSING

- Prepared and distributed the 2010 Development Trends Report to communities and the news media.
- Drafted a process to conduct a Workforce Housing Assessment to help communities determine if their planning regulations and laws are in compliance with the Workforce Housing law.
- Participated in workforce housing forums with the Work Here, Live Here CEDS Committee, and the Eastern Lakes Region Housing Coalition.

## NATURAL RESOURCES

- Presented water resources ordinances for the Regional Environmental Planning Program (REPP) at a statewide planning conference. The LRPC received the 2010 Source Water Protection Award from the NH Department of Environmental Services for providing a pioneering example of regional groundwater protection in New Hampshire.
- Secured nearly \$100,000 from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to expand planning efforts on the Lake Winnepesaukee Watershed Management Plan (LWWMP). Support was provided from U.S. Senator Gregg.
- Continue to represent the region at meetings of the Lakes Region Household Hazardous Product Facility to explore the ways and means the facility may encourage other communities to participate.
- Received support from the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) and the federal American Recovery and Revitalization Act (ARRA) to continue work on the Pemigewasset Watershed Co-occurrence Model.
- Continue to organize and coordinate two annual Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collections a year, involving 24 member communities. The 2010 collection was the largest collection ever in terms of volume.

This 2011 request is based on a decrease (35.6%) in number of visits. While most of the towns unrecoverable service billing (non-payment for services rendered) increased at even a higher rate reflective of the general downturn in the economy and increase in the uninsured and underinsured population, your town decreased. In order to provide services to residents we have had to increase efficiencies in our annual operations while maintaining the same quality of care. The agency is well aware that town budgets are limited in their resources to provide to non-profit organizations and therefore have requested a modest increase

We are pleased to report that we are on track with our fiscal 2010 budget. The Agency continues to provide the full range of Home Health, Child Health Programs, and Hospice services throughout our coverage area: 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

We are also pleased to report that we have received the approval of the Secretary of State to merge our organization with Community Health & Hospice of Laconia. This will take place on October 15, 2010. This partnership resulted from a long planning and study period. The merger will strengthen our ability to continue our non-profit mission and streamline the administration of both agencies in the face of proposed health care cuts. We will continue all services and maintain the Wolfeboro office. To the community and our clients the transition will be seamless.

The Board and Staff of the VNA-Hospice of Southern Carroll Co & Vicinity, and on behalf of its' patients, are most grateful for the continuing support of your community.

Visits to clients in your community made up almost 3.9% of total Agency visit activity.

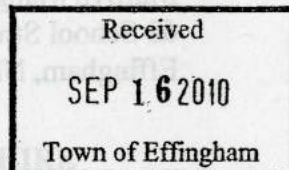



Enclosed please find the White Mountain Community Health Center's 2011 request for funds.

The services provided by WMCHC are targeted to the uninsured and underinsured residents of the area. We are a safety net for a population that would likely not access medical care if the Center's services were not available. No one requesting services is denied for financial reasons.

Funding from Effingham is essential to the continuation of services for your residents. Our 2010 request was based upon a projected 60 patients from your town, and 64 were actually seen. The cost per patient is \$368.76, with patient revenues and other support covering all but \$25.81 of that amount. Our 2011 request, based upon a projection of 61 patients from your town multiplied by \$25.81, amounts to **\$1,574.00**. This amount is a slight increase over last year's request.

The Center is aware of and appreciates the many financial issues facing our area towns. We would like to stress that our presence in the community helps alleviate much of the healthcare related burden of towns and their residents. For example, our Medication Bridge Program saved Effingham residents over \$6,900.00 in prescription costs.

# WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

## *Affordable Healthcare for All*

### **MISSION**

The goal of White Mountain Community Health Center (WMCHC) is to provide high-quality health care services, and related support services, for the uninsured and underinsured residents of our area. WMCHC provides a critical safety net in our local health care system. No child or adult is refused health care for financial reasons.

WMCHC, as a not-for-profit healthcare entity, is the only practice in the immediate area to offer a sliding fee scale. In an economy that is primarily tourist based, wages are at the lower end of the spectrum. Because of high costs, insurance can be out of reach for local employers and employees. Our sliding fee schedule helps promote access to healthcare for those who might otherwise be excluded due to financial issues.

**In Fiscal Year 10, WMCHC provided over \$400,000.00 in free and reduced rate services to patients who live and work in our communities.**

### **FUNDING**

WMCHC generates about half of its income from patient service revenues. Other revenues, which are essential to maintaining services, include:

- Program grants from the State of New Hampshire
- Support from Memorial Hospital
- Town Appropriations from multiple towns
- Grants
- Fund Raising and Donations

WMCHC does not receive federal funding on a regular basis. We will, on rare occasions, be appropriated funds to help cover costs.

### **VALUE**

WMCHC is of value not only to the residents of area towns, but to the towns themselves. **The presence of WMCHC in the area helps towns reduce the financial expense and time commitment involved in addressing the healthcare needs of their low income uninsured residents.**

- Residents can become patients at the Center and obtain healthcare on a sliding fee.

- Residents who are patients have access to our Patient Assistance Funds, to help pay for medications, transportation, and specialist services, and to our food pantry.
- Residents who are patients have access to networked social workers, who can assist patients access a variety of local, state and federal assistance programs

## TOWN SUPPORT

Since 2002, WMCHC has sought, and received, support from area towns. Over those years, the Center has increased from 7,796 visits to 14,216 visits in FY10 by providing and enhancing services to an ever-increasing patient base. From a funding standpoint, this has been accomplished through increased state support, increased support from Memorial Hospital, and increased patient revenues. The total amount we request from the towns has not differed substantially from our original request.

*The investment towns make in the operations of WMCHC is repaid in the health of residents, and in defraying costs to town budgets for assistance to their residents.*

## SERVICES

WMCHC offers a variety of healthcare services:

- Primary Care for men, women and children
- Prenatal services
- Pediatric healthcare
- Family Planning and Reproductive Health services
- Dental services for children up to age 20
- Nutritionist
- Mental Health services
- Social Work services
- Tobacco Cessation

► *WMCHC participates in the following programs:*

**Medication Bridge Program** assists our patients with their long term pharmaceutical needs for chronic conditions. Medications are donated by the pharmaceutical companies. WMCHC pays the employee who performs this function, so there is a nominal processing cost to the patient. **In FY10 this program saved participants \$930,252.00 in medication costs.**

**Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program** of New Hampshire is a program program in which women who are our patients are screened at the Center. If a screening results in a health issue requiring follow up, the program will pay for follow up off site examinations and testing. Funding is from the State of New Hampshire.

### **Adult Dental Services Fund: Tooth Extractions**

This state funded program pays for the cost of an adult tooth extraction. This is of great value to our patients, who typically do not have finances for restorative care or extractions.

### **Partners in Health of Carroll County**

WMCHC is the home base for this county-wide organization, which assists families in which a child has a chronic illness. Examples of such illnesses are diabetes, leukemia, asthma and other debilitating conditions. PIH provides assistance in a variety of ways, from financial to case management. This program is funded by the Hood Center at Dartmouth, the Bureau of Developmental Services and NH Medicaid.

► *WMCHC created, alone or in partnership, the following programs:*

## **PATIENT ASSISTANCE FUNDS**

*The following funds are financed entirely with fund raising activities and donations*

### **Emergency Medication Fund**

To assist our patients with their immediate pharmaceutical needs (such as antibiotics, which Medication Bridge does not cover) or to assist patients with their medications during the six week processing period for Medication Bridge.

### **Transportation Fund**

To assist our patients with their transportation needs for medical care. Given the distances involved in our area and the lack of public transportation, WMCHC saw a need to provide a method of helping patients get to their appointments at WMCHC, or to places as far away as Portland and Hanover (Dartmouth).

### **Medical Consultation Fund**

To assist our uninsured or underinsured patients with paying for medically necessary services at other facilities, when other assistance is not available.

### **Food Pantry**

A food pantry, available to our patients, is managed by our nutritionist. Funding comes from FEMA's Emergency Food program, and donations of food items and cash.

### **Shirley Rae Moon Walker Fund**

This fund assists women who do not qualify for any other program in obtaining mammograms and ultrasounds for screening or diagnostic purposes. WMCHC is the administrator for this fund, which is maintained entirely by private donations.

**Miranda Leavitt Diabetes Fund**

This fund helps low income diabetic patients obtain laboratory tests, testing supplies, and other associated costs of treating diabetes. WMCHC is the administrator of this fund, which is maintained by private donations.

**PCOS Fund**

This fund helps patients pay for specialty testing for the condition Polycystic Ovarian Syndrome, a hormone issue. The initial funding came from a grant through the NH Charitable Foundation. WMCHC is the administrator of this fund, which is maintained by private donations.

Our organization is requesting the sum of \$840 from the Town of Effingham for the 2011 budget year.



Selectmen of Effingham:

OCF spent \$9,093, or an average of \$245 each, in direct services for 37 grants to children of your town during its last fiscal year. We anticipate similar amounts this year.

Ossipee Children's Fund therefore requests the town of Effingham to appropriate \$1,000 at the annual Town Meeting in order to help pay for some of the costs of OCF's assistance to your children. (This amount would be an increase of \$250 over last year's appropriation but we encourage towns to pay 25% of the assistance we provide and in your case, 25% would be \$2,273.)

OCF provides essential services of child care, recreation, enrichment, and educational opportunities. Operated by a board of volunteers, our costs remain at or below 1% of all money we receive.

For qualifying (low income) families, OCF pays \$1,410 toward the cost of full time child care for each preschooler and \$645 for each school-ager in need of care. OCF provides up to \$440 for each child whose family needs help with the costs of enrichment, recreation, and educational programs.

Ossipee Children's Fund appreciates the generosity of the town in helping with this important service.
