Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Eight Hundred Four Dollars (\$25,804.00) to contract the services of Avitar Associates of New England, Inc. for the year 2014. The \$1,000.00 was received from the Town of Parsonsfield in 2013 for Fire Department Mutual Aid. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Six Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$46,900.00) to purchase a new vehicle for the Police Department. This is a special warrant article.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Municipal Garage Capital Reserve Fund and place the current balance of \$8,291.69 as of December 31, 2013, plus any accumulated interest to date in the general fund. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

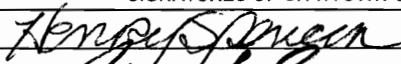
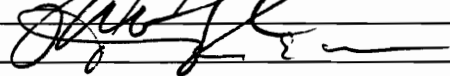
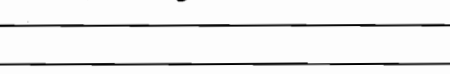

Session II: Michael Pilkovsky, Moderator gaveled the meeting to order 9:00 AM on Saturday, March 16, 2013 with approximately 70 Effingham residents present. Town Clerk Marilyn Maughan, read the election results from March 12, 2013. The pledge of allegiance was said by those present. A moment of silence was held to remember those Effingham residents that passed away in 2012. Moderator Pilkovsky then proceeded to explain how the meeting would be conducted and read Article 4 to the voters present.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Eight Hundred and Four Dollars (\$25,804.00) to contract the services of Avitar Associates of New England, Inc. for the year 2013. This sum represents payment for the third year of a five-year level funded contract that provides for a full update of property values to market rate in 2015 as required by RSA 75:8-a, as well as general assessing services throughout each of the five years and field data verification of information appearing on property tax cards. This requires a majority vote. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. The article was moved by Susan Slack, seconded by Henry Spencer.

No discussion. The article passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Six Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$26,550.00) from the undesignated fund balance to be added to the Fire Truck and Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The \$26,550.00 was received from the sale of the Effingham Fire Department Ambulance in 2012. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. The article was moved by Henry Spencer and seconded by Susan Slack. No discussion followed. The article was moved by Melissa Seamans and seconded Patricia Riker. The voters allowed Doris Cirois Co-Director of the Freedom Food Bank to speak on the article. Following discussion, the article passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote accept Henry Drive, now a private road, as a Town maintained Class V roadway. This article is petitioned by Melanie Peabody and others. This requires a majority vote. The article was moved by Melanie Peabody and seconded by Sheila Jones. The moderator announced he was given a petition to hold a ballot vote on this article which will take place following discussion of the article. There were several amendments proposed to the article. One of which amended the article to read: . . . “the date of acceptance is effective upon inspection of Henry Drive by the town’s consulting engineer and determination by the Board of Selectmen that Henry Drive meets town subdivision specifications and standards.” The amendment to the article passed by majority voice vote. Selectmen's report, 2013

This year saw the return of Mr. Timothy Eldridge as selectman to serve on the board with Ms. Theresa Swanick and Mr. Henry Spencer. Selectman Eldridge's past experience and ability has been a welcome addition to the town's governance.

The third and final section of Townhouse road was reconstructed and paved this year, and the middle section of the road was repaved by FR Carroll after this section's paving the previous year proved to be defective. The repaving was done at no additional cost to the town. It remains in the coming year to put the final layer of paving over the entire three mile distance of Town House road.

The town has received a preliminary Inventory and Assessment of Road Surfaces report from the UNH Technology Transfer Center on existing road conditions including a proposed longterm plan for continuing maintenance which can be used to establish scheduling for future repairs and upgrades. The condition and maintenance of town roads, both dirt and paved, remains one of the larger challenges within town. The selectmen have had numerous discussions relating to the specification requirements for future summer and winter road contracts and are endeavoring to map out the actual plan and schedule for future projects.

The transfer station re-design moved along much slower than hoped for but is currently very close to completion. The requirement of a well and water system added an additional degree of both expense, timing and complexity. When completed the new station will allow the town to achieve some lowering of the cost to operate the station on a monthly basis and in the future will offer selectmen more options when negotiating future contracts to haul our waste away. Importantly, safety concerns expressed by the Town's underwriters and requirements of the US Department of Labor have been addressed.

A considerable capital investment was made to the Library's heating this fall with the replacement of three ten year old kerosene monitors with three new propane heaters. Indications from the staff and patrons of the library show that the new system actually heats the library.

The largest concern of the past year has been negotiating a new ambulance service contract. The costs of this service have risen steeply in our region and the state, with the town's costs rising from roughly thirty thousand dollars to one hundred and thirty thousand dollars. Selectman Eldridge has headed up the negotiation on this issue and accomplished all that could be done. An article has been placed on the ballot to raise the money required for the new contract and the entire Board agrees that the contract offers not just the best that can be crafted but the only real option on the table.

Future concerns discussed over the last year by the selectmen involve replacement of the town's salt storage shed which has serious structural deficiencies, catching up with required road work, planning for needed bridge repairs, the equitable and efficient dealing with property tax delinquency further development of the town's web page and the consistent concern arising from raising funds to pay for provided services.

The Board extends it thanks to the Town's municipal staff and employees who constantly look for ways to improve service and keep down costs and have exemplified the term public service. Additional thanks to everyone who attend selectmen's meeting, the value of public participation cannot be overrated.

General Assistance Year End Report 12/8/13

I am pleased to report that once again I was able to stay within my budget. As you are aware the food stamp program lost it's funding so many people saw a reduction in their allotment. This impacted my office in the numbers of people looking for help with food, and the food pantries shelves being emptied quickly.

The fuel assistance budget was funded this year but at a lower level so people will only get one tank full of what ever fuel they are using, and then I am expecting people to come here. The electric issues with the large bills I was being given were a challenge to deal with but I was once again able to help people but not drain my budget.

Many of my long term clients are coming to me for gas vouchers so they can get to work due to all the changes in the federal guidelines.

I have updated the guidelines so we are in compliance and these were approved by the board on 11/19/13.

There is the never ending updating of forms and files which will occur slowly over this coming year.

I am anticipating using a new computer program in the coming 2014 season which I hope will help this office become more efficient and decrease the paper and duplication which occurs due to the need for multiple forms. It is my hope this program will more then pay for its self and create a more user friendly system that will allow us to create everything electronically. This will also make it possible to interface with some of the states systems for statistic reporting which is required every year.

I do have clients that are going to be long term due to the low pay they receive and I have clients that need help for a few months and then they are off the roles. It is very hard to anticipate how many people will need assistance in the coming year but in addition to the financial help they receive from this office I also try and guide them toward becoming as independent as they can and this pays off in people being able to make it on there own.

I do not see the need to increase my budget from the \$20,000 allocated yearly.

Annual Report for Effingham Police Department

It was a busy year in 2013 for the Effingham Police Department.

A multi agency search spanning over 48 hours was successfully brought to a close when a hiker found a young woman missing from Lakeview Neurorehabilitation Center. She was slightly hypothermic and had been exposed to the elements for an extended period of time but was unharmed. Special thanks to New Hampshire Fish and Game, New Hampshire State Police, Carroll County Sheriff's Office, numerous area fire departments, New Hampshire Civil Air Patrol and the many dedicated volunteers who assisted during this rescue operation.

A new reverse 911 system is now on line to enable state, local and town officials to better keep the public informed in the event of public safety events. The system uses residential and commercial land line phones to transmit critical messages to residents and relay instructions should the need arise. Cell phones will need to be registered with the program to receive alerts and information.

Chief Timothy Butts and Chief Randy Burbank of Effingham Fire Department attended training with the state 911 communications system to be able to access the system to keep residents better informed in the case of any unusual events.

Effingham Police Department welcomes two new part time patrol officers. Officer Mark Ciarfella and Officer Eric Diaz now compliment the full time department. Each will work patrol shifts and conduct criminal investigations and traffic enforcement.

Effingham Police Department officers continue to train in active shooter response, critical incident management, Domestic Violence Intervention, In-service training and any other curriculum deemed appropriate by New Hampshire Police Standards and Training.

Operation Safe Commute and Selected speed patrols will continue in the year 2014. Effingham Police Department reminds motorists to observe the posted speed limits and drive with due care.

Library Director's 2013 Report

2013 was a year of changes, as we continue efforts to make the Library more inviting and comfortable and more available to the community. Library Assistant John Mingori retired in March, and Crystal Hoyt was hired to fill the position. Crystal has taken on all of the children's and teen's programming, as well as running the Circulation Desk.

Currently, the library collection consists of 11,333 items, which includes books, audio books, videos and DVDs, and music CDs. Through purchase or donation, 841 items were added to the library collection, and 908 items were removed to make room for new materials. Removed items were sold or donated to other libraries, or sold in the Library's annual Book Sale. In addition, we have subscriptions to several magazine titles for adults, teens and children; a telescope; and Kill-A-Watt meters, all of which can be borrowed. In addition, library patrons have access to over 6,300 eBooks and 5,500 audio books through the New Hampshire Downloadable Books Consortium. Library patrons also have access to a variety of online databases, including Ancestry.com; EBSCO; Encyclopedia Britannica Online; and Career Cruising. The Library website also provides links to a variety of informational resources.

Patron visits were down significantly over last year, but circulations remained steady: fewer people are borrowing the same number of items. Our website is functioning as an online branch library, allowing patrons to request, reserve and renew items from home; download audio and eBooks from the state-wide Downloadable Books Consortium; access our online databases; and search for and request materials for Interlibrary Loan. Use of Downloadable books increased by 11% over 2012.

The last of our public access desktop computers was retired this year. We purchased two Chromebooks which allow patrons to browse the internet more quickly than conventional laptops. Patrons can now check out a laptop at the Circulation Desk, and use it anywhere in the building. We purchased a VisionBoard keyboard, which has oversized keys and is designed for people with limited vision or manual dexterity, and can be used with any of the laptop computers. The printer and the old copier were replaced with a new wireless printer, which not only prints from all of the library computers, but also allows patrons to print wirelessly from their own computers or mobile devices. The circulations computer was also upgraded this year.

The heating system has been switched from kerosene to propane monitors. This upgrade has resulted in a much more even and consistent warmth throughout the building, allowing us to set and keep the thermostats at a lower temperature. Patrons, staff and volunteers alike are enjoying coming in to a warm building.

Local artist Mykayla Holbrook was commissioned to paint a mural in the Children's Room. One wall has been transformed into a beautifully detailed rain forest, full of colorful plants, insects and exotic animals.

Thanks to a bequest from the estate of Larry and Jackie Leavitt, the Library purchased a modern entertainment system for the Meeting Room, consisting of a 70" flat screen TV and surround-sound system. The new system enhances our movie presentations, and also allows presenters to project slide shows or other program from their laptop computers, a library computer, or other digital media. Generous donations from two patrons allowed us to purchase two new sofas for the Meeting Room. Magnetic Moon Fairs and Festivals donated new bookshelves and new chairs for the Children's Room. Carol Pfister donated a picnic table, where patrons can access our wireless signal after hours in good weather.

The Friends of the Effingham Library purchased passes to the Remick Farm and Country Doctor Museum in Tamworth, the Wright Museum in Wolfeboro, and a 2-for-1 pass to the Jackson Ski Touring Foundation for the 2013-14 season. In addition, they sponsored most of our children's special events throughout the year, as well as two gardening programs. The Effingham Historical Society purchased two passes to the New Hampshire Historical Society Museum and Library.

The 2013 Summer Reading Program theme was "Dig Into Reading." Twenty children participated this year. They read 487 books, and logged 12,855 minutes of reading time, or 214.25 hours! Special events included

a kickoff event by Wildlife Encounters, who brought a variety of live animals; a visit from the Boston Museum of Science doing a program on digging for Dinosaurs; and a Kids Books, and the Arts program by magician/storyteller Mike Bent.

Library staff and volunteers continue to provide a wide range of programs for all ages and interests, including story times, Krafty Kids activities and special holiday events for children; Writer's Night, the Knit and Crochet Group, the Drake's Corner Literary Society, and First Wednesday Movies for adults; and Saturday Matinee movies for families. Highlights this past year included a month-long display and demonstrations of an 18th-Century printing press; a UNH Extension Services program, *Gardening for Butterflies and Other Pollinators*; a Speaking For Wildlife program, *Bats in Our Town*; Armchair Traveler programs by John Mingori and Johanna Vienneau; and a Stuffed Animal Sleepover.

Library staff are indebted to our amazing volunteers, who provided over 445 hours of service in 2013, or 20.5 weeks of time. Many thanks to regular volunteers Michael Davidson, Kathy Lambert, Carol Pfister, Ginny Dumas, Donna Gruel, Johanna Vienneau, Erik Jones, and A.J. Lavoie, for all you do each week! And thank you to all the other volunteers, who show up for special projects when needed. Their dedication and contributions are invaluable.

To the residents of Effingham, our deepest thanks for your continued support of the library and library staff. If we can help in any way, or if you have questions, comments or suggestions, please contact any library staff member. Remember, the Effingham Public Library is YOUR library!

5. Used oil recycling is available. **ALL** oil *must* be given to the attendant on duty, *must* be in a clean, clear container and free of any of the following contaminants:

FOREIGN MATERIAL**

Only oil from residents is acceptable. No commercially gathered oil can be taken. To keep the Oil Storage Area clean and safe will require the effort of all who use it. Please bring your used uncontaminated oil to the transfer station in a container that is clean both on the inside and outside.

6. The following refuse will **NOT** be accepted:
- Explosives such as dynamite
 - Gas or gas products (exception is used uncontaminated oil in acceptable container)
 - Other hazardous items such as strong acids and basis, highly volatile products, asbestos and florescent light bulbs
 - Human or animal waste
7. The Transfer Station Attendant and Town Police Department is empowered to enforce these rules and regulations. Violation of these rules and regulations could result in the loss of transfer station privileges.

The town is charged a hauling fee of \$212 for each MSW and Bulky container hauled away on top of the fee to process the tonnage of waste. Any reduction in hauling saves taxpayers.

The most significant reduction to the waste stream this year was seen for electronics and tire, after implementation of a small coupon fee. Electronics are freely recycled at some electronics stores (Staples), and tires are recycled at automotive shops for a small fee.

The redesign of the Transfer Station will initiate the combining of mixed paper with the comingled recyclables for what is called *Single Stream Recycling*. This combined recycling will now be compacted to reduce the trapped air in bottles to reduce the need for hauling.

A growing trend in waste management regionally and nationally is to separate out food scraps which comprise or contaminate almost 60% of household trash. With food scraps removed from household trash the frequency of hauling municipal solid waste is greatly reduced. This shift away from sending food scraps to the landfill has led to the expansion of home composting, local farm animal feed projects and municipal composting programs whereby food scraps are combined with yard waste to generate clean soil for grounds, yards and gardens. The staff at the Transfer Station attended an informational DES workshop about these issues this past year.

Annual Report 2013

The Planning Board conducted 12 regular meetings, on the first Thursday of each month, and 5 work sessions throughout the year.

While we had a quiet year for hearings, and were able to accomplish a number of strategic and “housekeeping” planning activities, summarized as follows:

1. Updates to the floodplain ordinance as passed at the 2013 Town Meeting; in accordance with FEMA’s revised Flood Insurance Rate Maps for Effingham;
2. Adjustment to the zoning ordinance for recreational vehicles, as passed at the 2013 Town Meeting;
3. Updates, approval and adoption of Chapters 1-8 of the Effingham Master Plan, and the addition of the Natural Resources Inventory Chapter; with special thanks to Mike Cauble for all of his efforts throughout the Master Plan update process, and to the Effingham Conservation Committee for the NRI;
4. Updates to the sub-division regulations;
5. Research into a Capital Improvement Plan for Effingham, with consultative assistance from Mike Izard of Lakes Region Planning Commission;
6. Updates to the major and minor site plan review checklists for improved ease of use for applicants;
7. Updates to the town maps and research into clarifying the Historic District and Village District boundaries, with special thanks to Jory Augenti and Paul Potter; and
8. Review of steep slopes for logging in Section 1705 of the Zoning Ordinance, with the recommendation for 2014 Town Meeting that this ordinance be updated to reflect Best Management Practices and reference the relevant RSA.

We look forward to continuing work on these and other planning initiatives important to Effingham in the year ahead.

Historic District Commission 2013 Annual Report

2013 has been a year of revitalization for the Historic District Commission. A frequent inability to achieve a quorum due to lack of members meant that at the beginning of the year, the Commission had been able to hold official meetings only twice since late 2011. In February, Ralph (Tom) Thompson agreed to an appointment to the Commission, followed by Erik Jones in March, and Neil (Eric) Potter in April, joining Paul Potter, Rebecca Harrington, and Andrew Hubbard to give the Commission a full membership. Sadly, with his death only one day after Eric Potter's appointment, the Commission lost long time member Andrew Hubbard. Despite this keenly felt loss, with five active members and a selectmen's representative, quorum became measurably easier to achieve and regular commission meetings have been able to resume.

Under Article 15 of the Effingham Zoning Ordinance, the Commission is charged with ensuring the purposes of the Historic Districts. In addition, the Commission administers designated scenic roads within the town. Tasks range from recommendations to other town boards regarding projects that would aid in these purposes to public hearings related to applications for work on properties in the districts.

During the course of 2013, the Commission held two public hearings. The first, in April, concerned a request by Public Service of New Hampshire (PSNH) to trim and/or remove trees along Hobbs Road, a designated scenic road. Commission members reported that the trees in question were dead and/or dying, posed a real threat to transmission lines, and that removal would not affect the scenic nature of the roadway. In addition, during public comment, statements were made regarding the great inconvenience of frequent power outages such trees cause. The Commission unanimously approved the PSNH request subject to the specifications and guarantees for debris removal as described by PSNH in their letter requesting the permission to cut. The second hearing in November concerned a request in the Lord's Hill District to alter doorways and roofs of a building in order to provide safer and more convenient access into the home and out to the yard. Statements made in support of the application noted that the changes were a matter of safety for the property owner and the public, were largely cosmetic, and did not affect the overall historic nature of the structure. The Commission discussed the desire to preserve the appearance of a building versus the need for livability. The Commission unanimously approved the application subject to the payment of required application and public notice advertisement fees.

Two other main projects took up the remainder of the Commission's schedule for the year. First, the Commission has been kept informed of the ongoing work of the Planning Board to develop correct and accurate maps of the historic districts for recording at the Country Registry. Such maps will greatly aid the Commission in its work by providing clear guidance as to where historic district restrictions apply. We look forward to the opportunity to refer to the new maps when they are completed! The second project has been the installation of signs delineating the boundaries of the Town's two historic districts. These signs will be two-sided and will advise motorists driving Province Lake Road (Route 153) that they are entering or leaving the respective districts. Tim Eldridge, as Selectmen's Representative to the Commission, has been instrumental in acquiring the necessary permissions to erect the signs within the state right-of-way along Route 153. It is hoped that these signs will be able to be put in place in the spring, as soon as ground and weather conditions permit, and subject to scheduling with the local NHDOT office.

With both recent and expected sales of properties in both the Lord's Hill and Center Effingham Historic Districts, the Commission expects to be busier in coming months than it has been in the recent past. The Commission meets the second Tuesday of each month at 7pm at the Municipal Offices and we encourage all Effingham residents to attend a meeting to learn more about the Commission and its work. 2013 Report from the Effingham Conservation Commission

Last year, Effingham Conservation Commission (ECC) received a request to supply a new picnic table for the summit of Green Mountain. The old table had fallen apart and there was no money in the Carroll County budget for a new one. ECC discussed this and felt it was a good idea to replace the table so hikers would have a place to relax and eat their meals. With a little research, we found R & R Woodworking in Jackson who builds cedar picnic tables. R & R gave ECC a discount on the table and delivered it for free to Effingham. After talking with Ed Maheux and Bob Boyd, of DRED's Forest and Lands, it was decided they would arrange delivery of the table to the summit. The table was picked up and that was the last we heard about this matter until a couple of ECC members climbed Green Mountain in August. They reported there were two new tables at the summit, but neither one was the ECC table! Whose tables are these and where did the ECC table go? It seems a eagle scout troop had the same picnic table idea as ECC did, but the troop decided to cut the pieces for the tables, climb Green Mountain and assemble the tables at the summit. With some inquiry, we found the ECC table at Bob Boyd's house. After more discussion, ECC requested the table be returned to us so that it could be installed at the Rt. 153 boat ramp. This well traveled picnic table has been installed and awaits any picnic people in the future.

Also, ECC installed an ADA compliant picnic table at the Larry Leavitt Preserve. We cleaned up the preserve and Effingham has another place to picnic and enjoy nature.

This year's Earth Day Poster Contest theme at Effingham Elementary School was "Helping Hands Help the Earth". A prize was awarded to each grade.

Our annual roadside trash clean up broke our previous records--138 trash bags were collected. Thanks again to all the volunteers who help keep Effingham clean. This year's clean-up is Saturday, April 26. Please consider joining us-pick up a few bags of trash and enjoy a lunchtime barbeque.

ECC hired New England Milfoil again to clean up areas of milfoil in Ossipee Lake and River. The good news was there was less milfoil in areas that have been previously cleaned up, but we found new areas of infestation in Ossipee River. Thanks again to Bill Klotz for accepting the milfoil which he will use for compost.

Sadly, ECC had to accept David Goulet's resignation from ECC because of his postal job. Happily, Al Levesque was reinstated as a member after an absence from the ECC.

Effingham's Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA)

From the New Hampshire Office of Energy and Planning:

"For many years, zoning boards of adjustment have played an important, but little noticed role, in the development of New Hampshire communities. Sometimes praised, sometimes criticized, they have continued to perform their principal role - reviewing applications for zoning variances, special exceptions, equitable waivers of dimensional requirements, and hearing appeals from the decisions made by administrative officials - all without much fanfare. To a large extent, the success or failure of zoning administration rests on the proper exercise of judgment by members of the board of adjustment, and the job is not an easy one."

In 2013 the ZBA heard and decided four cases. ZBA activity often follows economic trends, particularly in regards to real estate development and property sales activities. As our local economy continues to improve, we should expect that the ZBA will see a correspondingly increased case load. But whether deciding on one or a hundred applications, each decision affects the lives and interests of our neighbors and ZBA is available to provide a critical service when needed.

Effingham's ZBA, as in all New Hampshire communities, is comprised of local citizens that offer their time and energies in an effort to balance the needs of the public good with the rights of land-owners in regards to the Zoning Ordinance and State land use regulation. This requires that ZBA members be well informed and capable of exercising common sense, fairness and objectivity in carrying out the duties of their positions.

Effingham has been fortunate in having a high caliber of individuals on the ZBA. But additional members are needed to ensure the continuity of the Board into the future. If you have an interest in serving your community, while learning a great deal about important land use regulation, I encourage you to attend a first Wednesday meeting, or contact a member of the Board to find out more details. Effingham is better with your participation.

Thanks to the members of the ZBA in 2013; Jory Augenti, Mike Cahalane, and Tim White. I express special gratitude to Fran Marchand for continuing to serve as an alternate member and providing the all-important fifth member when matters are brought before the board.
