To the inhabitants of the Town of Effingham in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs: Polls not to close before 7:00 P.M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Effingham Elementary School, 6 Partridge Cove Road, in said Effingham on Tuesday, the 8<sup>th</sup> day of March 2016, next at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subject:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing:

#### Article 2.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 2016-1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Change Article 7, Section 708 Lot Density to read: "For non-conforming lots of one acre or less, the total area of all existing and proposed structures shall be limited to 20% of the gross lot area. "Total Area of all Structures" in this section shall mean that part of the structures which cover the ground under it (footprint), including all deck, porch and roof overhangs that extend more than 2 feet. All other requirements of this ordinance shall be met."?

The Planning Board is in favor of this article.

#### Article 3.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 2016-2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 10, Section 1006 Campgrounds to include the following: "(f) Campsites

- i. A minimum of 600 sq. ft. shall be provided for each tent site and a minimum of 1,000 square feet shall be provided for each recreational vehicle and trailer campsite, with or without connection to an approved sewage disposal system (RSA 216-I: 3).
- ii. RV and trailer campsites are allowed a total of 640 sq. ft. per site, inclusive of the RV or trailer and all other structures, not to be permanent in nature and to have no permanent footings or foundations.
- iii. Two (2) parking spaces per campsite at 160 sq. ft. each (8 ft. x 20 ft.) are required either within the campsite or two (2) parking spaces specifically designated for said campsite are provided elsewhere.
- iv. Single story camping cabins as per RSA 216-I:1 VII-a are allowed a total of 640 sq. ft. per site, inclusive of the camping cabin and all other structures, not to be permanent in nature and to have no permanent footings or foundations.
- v. No tent, tent trailer, travel trailer, motorized camper, pick-up camper, single story cabin or pick-up coach shall be used as permanent year-round residence."?

The Planning Board is in favor of this article.

### Article 4.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 2016-3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 11, Section 1102.2 Enforcement and Penalty to read: "Section 1102.2 Enforcement and Penalty - Any person who violates this Ordinance may be fined in accordance with RSA 676:17,I. No action may be brought under this provision unless the alleged offender has had at least seven (7) days' notice by certified mail that a violation exists."?

The Planning Board is in favor of this article.

#### Article 5.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 2016-4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Article 15, Section1502 Historic Districts, "Pursuant to NH RSA 674:46, the Town of Effingham hereby establishes the Center Effingham Historic District and the Lord's Hill Historic District, which are bounded as in Appendix A."? (This is a housekeeping item.) The Planning Board is in favor of this article.

#### Article 6.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 2016-5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 15, Section 1502 Historic Districts to clarify the metes and bounds legal description for the Lord's Hill Historic District? (This is in Appendix A.) The Planning Board is in favor of this article.

#### Article 7.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment 2016-6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Article 15, Section 1502 Historic Districts to clarify the metes and bounds legal description for the Center Effingham Historic District.? (This is in Appendix A. The Planning Board is in favor of this article.

Adjourn meeting as per vote. Meeting will reconvene at the Effingham Elementary School, 6 Partridge Cove Road, Effingham on Saturday, March 12, 2016 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,680.00 to contract the services of Avitar Associates of New England, Inc. for the year 2016. This sum represents payment for the first year of a five-year level funded contract that provides for a full update of property values to market rate in 2020 as required by RSA 75:8-a, as well as general assessing services throughout each of the five years and field data verification of information appearing on property tax cards. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 9**. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for road reconstruction. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 10.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for paved road resurfacing and repair. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 11.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$143,830.00 for payments to the following Capital Reserve Accounts previously established:

The \$1,000.00 was received from the Town of Parsonsfield in 2015 for Fire Department Mutual Aid. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$260,000.00 to replace the bridge on Stevens Road. And further to authorize the governing body to withdraw \$150,000.00 from the undesignated fund balance for this purpose, with the remaining \$110,000.00 to be funded through taxation. This is a special warrant article. This requires a majority vote.

The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation.

**Article 15.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,479,668.00 for the ensuing year for general operations. This requires a majority vote.

To see if the Town will urge that the next President and Congress fight big money politics and restore government of, by and for the people by championing the We the People agenda: 1) Ban Super PACs and overturn Citizens United 2) Expose secret donors and require full transparency 3) Ban bribes from big-money lobbyists and government contractors 4) Establish small-donor, citizen-funded elections 5) End gerrymandering and modernize voter registration 6) Close loopholes and enforce campaign finance laws. That the New Hampshire State Legislature support concrete legislation to enact the We the People agenda. The record of the vote approving this article shall be transmitted by written notice from the selectmen to the NH congressional delegation and to Effingham's state legislators, and to the President of the United States informing them of the instructions from their constituents within 30 days of the vote. This article is petitioned by Arthur Surette and others. This requires a majority vote.

**Article 17.** To see if the Town of Effingham will vote "No Confidence" in the Effingham Fire Chief Randy Burbank. If the vote is affirmative, the Town asks the Board of Selectmen to remove him from office, if he doesn't resign, and to not allow him to drive any Town owned vehicles. The vote on this article is to be conducted by secret ballot. This requires a majority vote. This article is petitioned by Jerome Smith and others.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of its agents and auditors.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

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# Selectmen's Report

Prior to a list of those items that came to the selectmen's desk this year, we would like to start with some well deserved thanks. We want to thank all of our town's employees for doing their jobs so well, and extend both thanks and gratitude to all members, whether elected or appointed who have served on the various boards, committees and commissions in our town. This year has seen continuing increases in the membership of our volunteer fire department. Regular reports to us on advanced training attendance has been most encouraging. With criminal activity increasing steadily, our police officers have attended some important advanced training also. Our police department officers have been instrumental in some area wide criminal cases, with their contributions leading to the arrest of persons who have been preying on Effingham residents and residents of surrounding towns. Thanks to our town staff, our elected and appointed officials, our fire, rescue and police department personnel, Effingham is doing well.

We would like to extend our deepest thanks to Mrs. Shelia Jones for her many years of service as supervisor of the checklist. Since she has decided not to run for another term in office, her experience and knowledge will be missed. Let us all hope another with such a caring for precision and detail fills her position.

As is usual, our town road expenses represent a major portion of the budget. In 2015 extensive work was done to improve a large section of Granite Road. This project is expected to be completed in 2016. The intention to resurface a section of Green Mountain Road was forestalled due to estimates far in excess of what was expected, so our attention was given to working on smaller sections of our paved roads that needed extensive improvement to the substrata. These smaller jobs were costly, but this expense should be offset when it comes time to pave the entire distance of those roads when worked on in the future. Effingham crack sealed portions of our paved roads for the first time, with particular emphasis on the newest pavement. The selectmen have adopted a five-year road plan and an annual grading schedule, which should assist in making our annual budget estimates for roadwork more accurate.

Improvements were made at the transfer station. A secured fenced area was installed to contain appliances containing Freon, as required by DES. And, a fence was added for safety at an area with a substantial drop, where the old compactor was located. Also, a snow blower was purchased for the facility, which should minimize snow removal expense, and as you would imagine was an appreciated addition to our equipment according to our employees working there.

The new fire truck approved at town meeting last year, is expected to be completed and delivered sometime in February. A multi-year project of extensive improvements, to maximize efficient use of space at the Murray Field station #2 was completed this year. Thanks to the efforts and skills of department members, much of the expense of these improvements was avoided by their hard work.


The Library/ Town Hall had work done to bring some areas into ADA compliance, and there were improvements made to the basement utility room for efficiency in the operation of the

heating system. A base line data collection study was contracted for the parking lot. This study will be used to plan needed improvement to the parking area. A traffic mirror, to make exiting the parking lot safer, was installed in 2015.

The selectmen's office staff saw a small change in nomenclature with the changing of Mrs. Claudia Lamphier's title from Administrative Assistant to Town Administrator to more accurately reflect the job function being performed, and the addition of a new part time office assistant to help with the increasing work load. During the year the selectmen additionally accomplished the following: A perambulation of our borders with neighboring towns was started. Some town owned properties were auctioned or placed on the market for sale. The old building at 144 School Street was taken down with the granite foundation stones set aside for future use. While not a selectmen's accomplishment, but with our complete appreciation and approval, our residents can now pay their taxes, auto registration and dog license fees online, thanks to extensive research and training by the Tax Collector and her deputy. After years of dedicated effort by selectmen's office staff, GASB documentation compliance allowed for a new auditing firm to be retained, making Effingham able to apply for bonding should it become necessary. A policy for the disposal of road waste generated from work on town roads was adopted and is currently functioning well. The position of cemetery custodian was established and filled, which has brought a needed degree of predictability to the operation of Woodland Cemetery. The positions of fire warden and his deputies were appointed. The establishment of a five-year road plan, as mentioned, was adopted. The town's web site has seen continuing improvements as requested by users and officials, and has been getting a lot of use.

There are always surprises in the governing of a small town. The closing of the Granite Road bridge to all traffic, was an unwelcome surprise which complicated planning for the replacement of the Stevens Road bridge. An assessment study has been done for the bridges on Stevens Road, Hutchins Pond Road, Snow Road and Granite Road, all "red lined" by DOT. This engineering study will allow selectmen to prioritize repair/replacement of these structures, and assist in establishing how to approach funding these projects, to include the use of the State Bridge Aid Program.

We would like to thank those residents who have come out in good weather and bad, to attend our weekly selectmen's meetings over the past year. While all are not always in agreement with the decisions made by our Board, constituent input is an important aspect of a government "for the people and by the people".



At the directive of the NH Department of Transportation, the Granite Road Bridge was closed in the fall of 2015. The bridge is currently being assessed and evaluated to provide information for future reconstruction and/or replacement.



The 2015 continued road reconstruction project to improve sections of Granite Road. The past few year's funds have been appropriated to remove trees, widen the width of the road, improve the ditches and install culverts. Culverts have been purchased for the 2015 section which will be installation during the summer/fall of 2016 to complete this section.

Once again my office has networked with the Effingham Elementary school to try and help meet the needs of our kids so no one goes without the basic necessities of food and clothing. The fire department sponsors coats for kids as well as other organizations in town. There are people that have knit hats and mittens which will be handed out to the children in our community. My office always takes donations any time of year, so if you have clothes or things that need a new home that are in good condition please call my office and I will get back to you. I never know what people need so I try to collect things for future use. I try to be prepared for as many client needs as I can.

The new GAP computer system is ready to be implemented and I have decided to give it a year's trial to see if it will save the town money in the long run. I have taken the classes and there is a lot of support if needed. It takes time to process cases and having an online system to link us together will be a good thing for the town.

As everyone is aware we lost our largest employer in town as they closed their doors in October. This left many people without jobs which defiantly impacted my budget. Effingham is a hard place to live without public transportation, high rents, and traveling long distances to find a minimum wage job. With fuel prices being unpredictable and electric rates heading higher people are struggling to make ends meet.

I am thankful for the freedom food pantry which is open on Saturday mornings and serve the people of Effingham. There is a list of food pantries in the town office with information and other locations.

I always try and keep many different kinds of brochures on many different subjects for people to take. They can be found in the front hall and across from the tax collectors window. Another place to go for help with job searching or other inquires is the Effingham library. You will find most anything you are looking for and if they don't have it they will try and find out who does.

As always, this office tries to meet the needs of the client while staying within the budget. I want to thank the people that donate various things to my office so I can help with the many and varied needs people run into throughout the year. I am grateful to the people of Effingham for all that they do to make this a wonderful community to live in.

Your little library saw some big changes throughout 2015. Terry Wheeler, who became Library Director in June of 2014, unfortunately had to leave just over a year later for personal reasons. Terry was instrumental in securing the USDA grant we received in 2014. With that grant the library renovated shelving in both the Children's Room and the Teen Room at the tail end of 2014. The grant also provided funding for beautiful new cabinetry in the Director's Office, which was installed in May crafted by local woodworker and Library Trustee, Jack Williams. Following in the footsteps of former Director Marilyn Swan, Terry maintained the mission of "we want everyone to feel welcome at the library." Both she and Marilyn are truly missed.

Winter showed our usual dip in numbers as patrons scurried home to curl up with a book. We welcomed our devoted crowd for "First Movie Wednesdays", viewed on our 70 inch flat screen. The theme of "Director Wes Anderson Filmography" was a change from our former Library Aide, Gary's choices, but still held the *odd* flair that Gary was famed for. Folks also braved the weather for "Tea & Downton," keeping up with the Crawley family in season five while warming up with a 'cuppa. Our "Krafty Kids" group created some sweet Valentines for residents at the Mountain View Nursing Home in Ossipee. 2015 marked the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of "Writers' Night." In keeping with tradition, people flocked from far and wide to hear stories and music, view amazing book illustrations, toe-tap and hum to open mic stars, and savor special refreshments to celebrate a decade of amazing local talent. Anonymous patron donors graced us with a huge comfy "read to me" chair for the Children's Room, with handmade pillows to be enjoyed by all. We also received a donation to fund the complete collection of Maisie Dobbs, a popular series by Jacqueline Winspear, which we are overjoyed to have on our shelves.

Spring was well overdue after the seemingly endless winter. Our numbers bounced right back as patrons flocked in with spring fever. The stinky situation we had with the bathroom was resolved after discovering a loose toilet fitting, as was the fix-up of loose bathroom tiles; a relief for both staff and patrons who welcomed the fresh smell of spring flowers (not the compost they grow in!) We saw record breaking numbers for our "Easter Egg Hunt" and for a unique display of Effingham Elementary School artwork. A Governor Wentworth Arts Council grant allowed us to have a special program with "Lindsey and Her Puppet Pals." The New Hampshire Humanities Council provided a "Traditional Russian Nested Doll" program with Marina Forbes. Additional funding was provided by the Friends of the Effingham Library for a Russian Nested Doll Painting Workshop.

Summer was good to us. We attacked a major weeding project of old/never read books throughout the collection to put into the annual book sale. We kicked off our Summer Reading Program (SRP) with musician Steve Blunt, funded by a "Kids Books and the Arts Grant," and help from the Friends group. The theme for the SRP this year was, "Every Hero Has A Story." Library Aide, Cristin Harkins, arranged for some hilarious and creative activities for program participants. The Effingham Fire and Rescue came by to join in the fun and to show the kids the ins and outs of the rescue equipment. Famed magician Norman Ng concluded our program with an outstanding show that has left us still in awe. In total we had 24 SRP participants, who read a total of 317 books in 14,154 minutes! The Friends of the Effingham Library Annual Library Book Sale was held inside the library for a change. We didn't have the best turnout, but it sure was nice to be indoors with the A/C! A total of \$229.50 was raised in selling used books, audio books, DVDs, CDs, and games. Unsold items were picked up by Rolling Thunder, a local biker charity group (super cool people). Terry gave her notice in July, leaving Cristin to step-up to Interim Assistant Director, while I became Interim Library Director. We purchased two Google Chromebooks in September, which are great for quick, easy online searches when patrons are in a hurry.

Autumn was a whirlwind. Cristin assumed Children's programming responsibilities with a natural flourish. Effingham Elementary K-3 students enjoy a Storytime visit from Cristin once a month. "Krafty Kids," held the second Saturday of the month has become a new favorite, along with "Storytime for Little Ones," a treat which takes place each Friday morning. Both the Halloween and Christmas Parties were well received by large numbers of devoted patrons and new faces, too. Cristin has brought new energy and a burst of creativity to all things children at the library. The second New Hampshire Humanities Council program we had, "Not So Elementary My Dear Watson," with Ann McClellan, was a crowd pleaser. You library patrons sure know a lot about Mr. Holmes! Our October Open House, in conjunction with the Free Masons, went very well with a Painting Restoration program by Martha Cox of GreatWorks Painting Restoration. The program was based around a library painting of local doctor, Samuel Sanders. Restoration of Dr. Sander's portrait was funded with the help of the Effingham Historical Society, the Friends of the Effingham Library, library trustees, and countless private donations. The annual "One Book One Valley" program chose the book "Euphoria" by Lily King. When asked if we could recommend anyone for an anthropological program to tie in with the book, were proud to suggest a talk by library patron Kamal Nath. In addition to Mr. Nath's presentation, "A Few Glimpses of India (Past)," he also coordinated our library book discussion of "Euphoria." Appropriately close to Halloween, Mr. Nath gave an insightful presentation with the Green Mountain Conservation Group on "What's up with Bats in NH?" For a second time, the library booked Pontine Theatre of Portsmouth for a library program during "Christmas in Effingham." The Effingham Historical Society and Friends of the Effingham Library funded the Pontine production of "A New England Christmas." Library Treasurer, Erik Jones, strung the window lights in all six--count 'em--six floors of the library town house building for the holiday season!

On behalf of Cristin Harkins and myself, we would like to humbly thank the people of Effingham and our patron friends near and far for supporting the staff changes at the library. Both Cristin and I gladly stepped into our new positions of Assistant Library Director and Library Director at the start of 2016. Thank you to our volunteers, who helped out tremendously with the staff transitions and with timely projects. We would have been lost without you. We cannot wait to tell you more about the library. Lend us your ears and we'll lend you ours as we dive into new chapters at the Effingham Public Library.

1. Trash and recyclables will be accepted only during scheduled hours.

**NOTICE:** To those residents of Effingham utilizing transfer station permits for commercial vehicles as authorized by the Board of Selectmen, you are in possession of an Effingham Transfer Station Permit for a commercial vehicle to be used for the disposal of your personal household trash. Disposal of **any** commercial trash related to your employment or otherwise is **NOT** permitted.

- 2. All trash and recyclables shall be placed in designated containers.
- 3. The following refuse will be accepted at the transfer station:
  - Paper Recyclables and Cardboard Boxes- must be broken down.

<u>Unacceptable</u> items in paper/cardboard recyclables are as follows:

Wax paper of any kind (i.e. waxed cardboard)
Gift Wrap Carbon paper Milk Cartons
Plastic Bags of any kind Tyvek Envelopes
Blue Prints Hard cover books w/covers

- Glass bottles and jars of all colors, clean aluminum/tin cans and plastics #1-7
- Large metals including: refrigerators, washers, dryers, stoves,

bicycles, bed springs, grills, empty drums

- Brush including stumps up to 5" and untreated wood scraps
- Household garbage
- A demolition container is also available for homeowners who need to dispose of SMALL
  amounts of construction debris and/ or furniture such as: treated/painted wood,
  upholstered furniture, a mattress.

DEMO- CONTAINER IS NOT FOR CONTRACTORS!

- 4. Disposal of the following items may be paid for at the Transfer Station. <u>CASH ONLY!</u>
  - Tires: \$2.00 each (max. dia. 20 inches)
  - Electronic w/visual display: \$10.00 each and includes: Televisions, PC Towers and Monitors.

5. Used oil recycling is available. **ALL** oil *must* be given to the attendant on duty, *must* be in a clean, clear container and <u>free</u> of any of the following contaminants:

GASOLINE ANTIFREEZE PAINT SOLVENT WATER FOREIGN MATERIAL

Only oil from residents is acceptable. No commercially gathered oil can be taken. To keep the Oil Storage Area clean and safe will require the effort of all who use it. Please bring your used uncontaminated oil to the transfer station in a container that is clean both on the inside and outside.


- 6. The following refuse will **NOT** be accepted:
  - Explosives such as dynamite
  - Gas or gas products (exception is used uncontaminated oil in acceptable container)
  - Other hazardous items such as strong acids and basis, highly volatile products, asbestos and florescent light bulbs
  - Human or animal waste
- 7 The Transfer Station Attendant and Town Police Department is empowered to enforce these rules and regulations. Violation of these rules and regulations could result in the loss of transfer station privileges.
- 8. **ADMISSION** to the Transfer Station is by **ANNUAL PERMIT ONLY**. Permits can be purchased at the Selectmen's Office. Permits are **NOT** available at the transfer station. The cost is \$1.00 and a copy of the vehicle registration must be presented at time of purchase. If you are renting and have not yet registered your vehicle in Effingham a copy of your lease agreement verifying your residency must also be presented. For more information you may contact the Selectmen's Office Mon., Tues., Thurs., 9:00am 2:00pm and Fri., 9:00am Noon @ 603-539-7770.
- 9. The transfer station will be closed in observance of the following holidays: Christmas, New Year's Day and Independence Day
- 10. Children under the age of 10 must remain in the vehicle. Per Order of the Board of Selectmen.

Your adherence to these rules and regulations is imperative to the operation of the Transfer Station and the working relationships between the Town of Effingham and its vendors.



### Lakes Region Household Hazardous Waste Collection 2015 Annual Report

The 2015 Lakes Region Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collections were held on July 25, 2015 and August 1, 2015 at eight different locations where households from 24 participating communities were able to safely dispose of hazardous waste products. This year more than 1,900 households took advantage of this opportunity, the highest number in more than a dozen years. These collection events were coordinated by the Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC), collection and disposal was handled by an EPA-certified vendor.

More than 35 tons of HHW, 32,000 feet of fluorescent bulbs, and 1,700 compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs) were disposed of properly through these collections. Flammables such as oil-based paint products, epoxies, and old gas continue to comprise the vast majority of the hazardous products brought to the collection, followed by pesticides and herbicides. For the second year in a row we were grateful to have the assistance of the NH State Police in disposing of some very old, volatile material brought to us by a resident.

Residents are encouraged to use latex paint when possible, for it is not considered a hazardous material in New Hampshire and any residue can be dried out and disposed of in the household trash. We also encourage residents to think carefully about how much of the materials purchased they will use (and how much will need to be disposed of) when purchasing a hazardous product. Reducing the amount of hazardous products purchased and properly disposing of hazardous wastes helps reduce the risk to our shared water resources and can reduce costs. We appreciate the efforts of the more than sixty volunteers and municipal staff whose assistance in publicizing and staffing the collection sites helps make these regional collections possible.

The next Lakes Region Household Hazardous Waste Collections will be held July 30, 2016 and August 6, 2016. All residents and property owners in participating communities are encouraged to take this opportunity to safely dispose of your household hazardous products. # TITLE LXIV PLANNING AND ZONING

# CHAPTER 674 LOCAL LAND USE PLANNING AND REGULATORY POWERS

# Regulation of Subdivision of Land

Section 674:39-aa

### 674:39-aa Restoration of Involuntarily Merged Lots. -

- I. In this section:
- (a) "Involuntary merger" and "involuntarily merged" mean lots merged by municipal action for zoning, assessing, or taxation purposes without the consent of the owner.
- (b) "Owner" means the person or entity that holds legal title to the lots in question, even if such person or entity did not hold legal title at the time of the involuntary merger.
- (c) "Voluntary merger" and "voluntarily merged" mean a merger under RSA 674:39-a, or any overt action or conduct that indicates an owner regarded said lots as merged such as, but not limited to, abandoning a lot line.
- II. Lots or parcels that were involuntarily merged prior to September 18, 2010 by a city, town, county, village district, or any other municipality, shall at the request of the owner, be restored to their premerger status and all zoning and tax maps shall be updated to identify the premerger boundaries of said lots or parcels as recorded at the appropriate registry of deeds, provided:
  - (a) The request is submitted to the governing body prior to December 31, 2016.
- (b) No owner in the chain of title voluntarily merged his or her lots. If any owner in the chain of title voluntarily merged his or her lots, then all subsequent owners shall be estopped from requesting restoration. The municipality shall have the burden of proof to show that any previous owner voluntarily merged his or her lots.
- III. All decisions of the governing body may be appealed in accordance with the provisions of RSA 676.
- IV. Any municipality may adopt local ordinances, including ordinances enacted prior to the effective date of this section, to restore previously merged properties that are less restrictive than the provisions in paragraph I and II.
- V. The restoration of the lots to their premerger status shall not be deemed to cure any non-conformity with existing local land use ordinances.
- VI. Municipalities shall post a notice informing residents that any involuntarily merged lots may be restored to premerger status upon the owner's request. Such notice shall be posted in a public place no later than January 1, 2012 and shall remain posted through December 31, 2016. Each municipality shall also publish the same or similar notice in its 2011 through 2015 annual reports.

- 1. Updated the zoning ordinance with changes passed at the 2014 Town Meeting;
- 2. Held 12 regular meetings, on the first Thursday of each month;
- 3. Conducted 8 work sessions;
- 4. Presided over 2 hearings and 2 voluntary lot mergers;
- 5. Conducted review of procedural questions and requests for guidance which came before the board;
- 6. Approved changes to the Driveway, Site Plan, and Subdivision regulations, and
- 7. Developed proposed updates to the zoning ordinance, Sections 708 (Lot Density), 1006 (Campgrounds), 1102.2 (Enforcement and Penalty), and 1502 (Historic Districts).

We look forward to continuing work on these and other planning initiatives important to Effingham in the year ahead.

## Effingham's Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA)

"The board of adjustment is an essential cog in the entire scheme of a zoning ordinance, and that lacking it, the ordinance before us is invalid as a zoning ordinance."

The New Hampshire Supreme Court

Communities in New Hampshire with a Zoning Ordinance are required by law to have a Zoning Board of Adjustment. It serves as an essential mechanism for addressing situations where the letter and administration of the ordinance is imperfect. Indeed, this imperfection is assumed, and thus the law provides this protection against the arbitrary abridgement of property owners' rights.

Effingham's ZBA, as in all New Hampshire communities, is comprised of local citizens that offer their time and energies in an effort to balance the needs of the public good with the rights of land-owners in regards to the Effingham Zoning Ordinance and State of New Hampshire land use regulation. This requires that ZBA members be well informed and capable of exercising common sense, fairness and objectivity in carrying out the duties of their positions.

Importantly, the ZBA, as a quasi-judicial body, is empowered to operate independently of the Planning Board, the Zoning Enforcement Officer and the Board of Selectmen. While required to follow the procedures put forth by State law, this independence from local land use authority is essential to the fair conduct of the cases that come before it.

In 2015 the ZBA heard and decided four cases. There were two additional applications that were subsequently withdrawn. While a modest number, these cases required a great deal of time and effort on the part of the Board and addressed important issues that affected not only the applicants, but the entire community.

The members of the ZBA in 2015 were Jory Augenti, Paul Bartoswicz, Mike Cahalane, Jim Pittman and Tim White. Additionally, Len Espie and Tom Hart joined the Board as alternates this year and were pressed into service on several occasions. They all deserve our thanks for their thoughtful and diligent efforts.

The Board called upon our Zoning Enforcement Officer, Rebecca Boyden to provide vital information in the course of hearing several cases. We appreciate her well informed input and engagement when we were required to prevail upon her.

Lastly, Barbara Thompson continues to provide superb service to the Board as Secretary, often enduring maddeningly arcane discussions but still getting them into the record accurately. Thank you for your patience and good works.

# Historic District Commission 2015 Annual Report

2015 has been a year of continued progress on various projects for the Historic District Commission. We began the year with six active members and the selectmen's representative, so a quorum has been easily achieved and regular monthly commission meetings have been conducted each month with the exception of February (due to weather!). In March, changes to Article 15 of the Town of Effingham's Zoning Ordinance reduced the number of seats on the Commission from seven to five. As a result, the two members whose terms expired at Town Meeting, Rebecca Harrington and Jade McRae, cycled off of the Commission. We thank both of them for their involvement, especially Mrs. Harrington, who has served for several years, including as Assistant Chairman. Otherwise, the Commission maintained a full, active membership, though the two alternate positions continue to remain vacant.

Under Article 15 of the Town of Effingham's Zoning Ordinance, the Commission is charged with ensuring the purposes of the Historic Districts. In addition, the Commission administers designated scenic roads within the town. Tasks range from recommendations to other town boards regarding projects that would aid in these purposes to public hearings related to applications for work on properties in the districts.

During the course of 2015, the Commission dealt with a varied docket of business, including the ongoing project to have Historic District boundary signs erected on Province Lake Road (Route 153) (getting through the state required process of installation continues to be difficult to schedule – we'll try once again in the spring!); responding to several inquiries by property owners regarding Historic District Regulations; approving four applications by property owners to undertake work on their properties; continuing to work with the town's webmaster to update and revise the Commission's section of the town; and discussing repair and restoration work to be undertaken at the Historic Effingham Town Hall, including what grants might be obtained for that work, in order to reduce the expense to the town and its taxpayers.

Two other projects took up the remainder of the Commission's schedule for the year. First, the Commission reviewed, revised, and/or approved a Commission workflow and checklist for applications, an Applicant checklist for applications, an Application for Certificate of Approval, and templates for a Certificate of Approval and Notice of Disapproval. In addition, as part of ongoing work with the Board of Selectmen and Zoning Enforcement Officer to create a process that is easily understood by the public, a brochure explaining how to apply for a Certificate of Approval from the Commission was created and can be obtained at the Selectmen's Office, from the Zoning Enforcement Officer, or on the Town's website. The final element of the Commission's work on policies, procedures, and documents was the adoption of a set of Rules of Procedure for the Commission, which will help to ensure that the Commission operates at its best! The second project has been a complete review of the metes and bounds descriptions of the Town's two historic districts. The Commission proposed to the Planning Board new, revised language for both descriptions. The proposed changes, which the Planning Board initially approved, pending the outcome of the required public hearing, would correct errors in the descriptions with regard to the intended district boundaries, as well as make the documents easier to understand for the public. If the proposed changes receive final Planning Board approval, they will appear on the Town's official ballot in March of 2016 for approval by the voters.

With recent sales of properties in both the Lord's Hill and Center Effingham Historic Districts, as well as rumors of more sales to come, the Commission continues to expect to be busy in 2016. The Commission meets the second Monday of each month at 7 p.m. at the Municipal Offices and we encourage all Effingham residents and/or taxpayers to attend a meeting to learn more about the Commission and its work. If you are interested in serving on the Commission, either as a full member or as an alternate, please do not hesitate to contact us.

# **Effingham Conservation Commission 2015 Annual Report**

At the start, 2015 looked like another low key maintenance year for the Effingham Conservation Commission. The Commission got its portion of the town website up and running. It arranged for some tree seedlings to plant around the boat ramp on the Ossipee River off Route 153. The Commission sponsored its usual Earth Day Poster Contest for Effingham Elementary School students with the theme "Kids 4 Earth." Are you still awake?

# And then things got interesting.

Litter cleanup volunteers were stunned to reach a total of 205 bags collected from the side of Effingham's roads in the annual spring event. This obliterated the previous record of 138 bags. Are Effingham's litterbugs reaching for new heights, or did the ECC pick up some sharp-eyed and energetic volunteers? Maybe a little of both .Come join us this year for some good old fun picking up trash on April 30th.

Meanwhile, on the water, the town's annual milfoil watch had only turned up the usual suspects when a paddler on Berry Bay escaped the fronds of a previously undocumented patch of the evil weed and alerted the Commission. The resulting harvest put a \$6,825.00 dent in the Invasive Plant trust fund, but it also beat back the tendrils of misery spreading over many yards of lake bed. This should reduce the town's outlay in subsequent years. Valiant volunteers from the Berry Bay Association, in canoes and kayaks, collected gallons of escaped fragments to prevent them from re-rooting downstream.

The year's excitement continued as a lot came available on Pine River Road, that the Commission is starting to raise funds to purchase for conservation and recreation on the Pine River. The site is 14.83 acres, with about a thousand feet of river frontage. If you know the Pine, you realize that's a straight line distance of about 300 feet...

The site includes wetland, some upland, and possibilities for a bit of walking trail and some wildlife and bird viewing sites. Donations would be tax deductible, in addition to the grant monies ECC is already seeking. No tax revenue would be required, since some upfront costs will be paid from conservation funds already on hand for such purposes, and the rest will be funded with grants and private contributions.

As I start my 3rd year of service to you and the State of New Hampshire in Council District 1, I am grateful and honored to serve you.

I continue to work with the Governor, Council and Legislature on the important issues impacting the State. The Heroin and Opioid epidemic has been the number one issue. The Governor and Council called for a Special Legislative Session on November 18<sup>th</sup> to address the statewide heroin and opioid crisis. A Joint Legislative Task Force on Heroin and Opioid Epidemic was formed and will make recommendations to the Governor and Legislature in the upcoming session.

Economic development is still my top priority for the Northern most Council District and I will work with community and business leaders to assist in the creation of jobs and economic opportunity. I am committed to the Balsams project in Dixville Notch and I will continue to work with the various public and private partners to move this project forward. Additionally, I continue to work with the county and regional economic development councils and executive directors on present and future economic opportunities to grow businesses in the District.

I join with the NH Congressional Delegation - Senator Jeanne Shaheen, Senator Kelly Ayotte, Congresswoman Annie Kuster and Congressman Frank Guinta in working with other New England states and our northern Canadian friends to seek economic opportunities and relationships.

The Ten Year Transportation Improvement Plan process working with the Department of Transportation and the Regional Planning Commissions has been completed. The Executive Council approved the final draft and submitted it to the Governor on December 16<sup>th</sup>. The US Congress passed the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, which provides increased federal funding to the State of New Hampshire over the next five years.
